THE COACHES

Bob Parks

Since assuming the head coaching reins in 1967, Bob Parks has compiled an enviable record as Eastern Michigan's head gren's track coach.

During the past 12 years, his Huron track teams won three NAIA indoor crowns (1969-71), two NAIA outdoor titles (1970-71), a NCAA-CD championship (1972) and placed seventh and fourth in the 1974 and 1975 NCAA-UD indoor meets.

Since joining the Mid-American Conference in 1971, Eastern has won three conference outdoor championships (1974, 77, 78) and has finished no lower than second since becoming eligible for the crown.

The Hurons have also earned numerous honors in cross country including three national titles and two MAC championships.

Parks is regarded as one of the finest judges of potential track ability in the nation. He has developed several All-Americans and Olympic performers - Dave Ellis, Tony Nelson and Hasely Crawford - among others.^C

The affable head coach takes a personal interest in his athletes and works closely with those striving for improvement. A case in point is EMU All-American Jim Deren who steadily improved throughout his career, culminating in a fourth place finish in the mile at the 1975 NCAA indoor meet.

His best high school time in the event was 4:30.3, a mark he managed to lower to 4:04.1 with the Hurons.

Parks is a graduate of EMU and captained the track squad in 1952. He has received numerous "Coach of the Year" honors and annually schedules only the strongest opponents for his squads.

Al Pingel

Assistant coach Al Pingel returned to his alma mater in 1967 after compiling an eviable record as a high school cross country and track coach.

While cross-country coach at Wyandotte-Roosevelt High School, his squads won 52 consecutive dual meets, including back-to-back unbeaten seasons (1966-67). During a three-year period (1964-66), his teams finished no lower than third in the State Class A meet.

Pingel has the distinction of lettering in track at the University of Wisconsin and Texas A & M (while in the Navy during World War II) plus EMU.

Like coach Parks, Pingel works closely with Huron runners and uses his extensive background in cross country and track to improve their performances.

A TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

Eastern Michigan has a nationally recognized men's track program.

Since the first Eastern runner hit the cinders before the turn of the century the Hurons have produced more than 71 championship teams and nearly 50 All-Americans.

And EMU trackmen have successfully competed against the world's greatest athletes in the Olympics. Two of the four Huron Olympians-Hayes Jones and Hasely Crawfordearned the coveted Gold Medal, symbol of the ultimate athletic achievement.

Record-breaking performances have become almost commonplace by EMU trackmen. There have been world records set in the 300-yard dash, the 440-yard dash, the 500-meter dash, the fourmile relay, the 880-yard relay, the shuttle hurdle relay and the three-mile run during the indoor track seasons. Many of these marks still stand.

The Hurons also stake claim to having the first 16-foot pole vaulter in Michigan Collegiate history. Bill Barrett soared 16 feet in 1966 to set a precedent which five EMU vaulters have since passed.

Since 1921 only three men have headed the EMU men's track program. Lloyd W. Olds served as head coach for over twenty years (1921-42) and compiled a brilliant dual meet record of 132-24 for a winning percentage of .846. Olds served as an assistant Olympic coach at the 1932 summer games and Olympic manager in the '48 games in London.

George Marshall succeeded Olds and also held the top job for over two decades (1943-66) during which time he helped develop Olympic hurdler Hayes Jones. Under Marshall, the Hurons scored a stunning upset over the Big Ten champion Indiana in 1958 at an indoor dual meet in Bowen Field House.

Both Olds and Marshall are enshrined in the EMU Athletic Hall of Fame. The outdoor track at Rynearson Stadium was named in their honor.

Bob Parks, a student-athlete under Marshall's tutelage, assumed the head coaching duties in 1967. He has worked diligently to maintain the tradition of excellence established by his predecessors.

THE FACILITIES

Eastern Michigan's track facilities include a 220-yard six-lane Grasstex indoor track in Bowen Field House and a quarter-mile eightlane outdoor track at Rynearson Stadium.

The indoor track is considered by most. competitors as "very fast." At least eight world records have been set on the indoor surface. Balcony seating for over 1,000 spectators provides an excellent view of all the action.



The Olds-Marshall outdoor track (named in honor of two former EMU head track coaches) is located inside Rynearson Stadium (where home football games are held). Long jump and high jump areas are adjacent to the track. The main grandstand will seat nearly 15,000 spectators and the field is lighted for meets in the evening hours.

Bowen Field House has been the site for numerous championship meets, both high school and collegiate. For instance, the Central Collegiate Conference Indoor Track Championships and the High School Huron Relays are held at Bowen, the latter annually.

The Olds-Marshall track will be the location of the 1979 Mid-American Conference Outdoor Championship meet (May 17-19).

THE MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE THE CENTRAL COLLEGIATE CONFERENCE

Eastern Michigan competes in the 10-member Mid-American Conference (MAC). The Hurons officially joined, July 15, 1971.

Other members besides EMU include Ball State, Bowling Green, Central Michigan, Western Michigan, Kent State, Miami (Ohio), Northern Illinois, Ohio and Toledo.

The MAC is known for its balance and competitiveness. Since becoming eligible for the track championship in 1972, Eastern has won the crown three times (1974, 77, 78). And the Hurons have never finished lower than third at the annual spring classic held at the end of the regular season.

The MAC stages the spring championships for track, tennis and golf at one of its member schools each year on a rotating basis. The Hurons will host the 1979 MAC spring championships.

Like EMU, the MAC has accumulated numerous honors world and nationwide. Five cindermen from conference schools have earned Gold Medals in the Olympics while 10 MAC runners have won national championships in NCAA competition. Five schools (including EMU) have placed in the top 10 among team finishers at NCAA indoor or outdoor championships.

Eastern also competes as a member of the Central Collegiate Conference (CCC), an organization of 22 primarily midwestern universities that annually compete at a league indoor and outdoor track meet. The Hurons have won four indoor and tied for one outdoor CCC championship. . 3

EMU's Jeff Dils bound for Cobo Hall

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YPSILANTI – Few sights are more painful to Coach Bob Parks than watching Jeff Dils bending every effort to get his steps, his footwork, his technique, down pat in the 110-meter intermediate hurdles.

Nowhere in the many events comprising the sport of track and field is a higher premium place upon good form than the intermediates and nowhere are the demands greater upon an athlete.

So the Eastern Michigan coach forces, himself, albeit with teeth clenched, to watch one of the best intermediate hurdlers in the Midwest all but stumble through a workout.

"He doesn't practice the intermediates much," Parks says. "I really don't want him to work at it. His form seems to get worse the more he works at trying to perfect it.

"Jeff is just a tough competitor," the coach added in explaining the junior's success in this event. "He just goes out and runs them."

This plan for competition carries over into just about any event where Parks chooses to place Dils and he can find himself running everything from a middle distance race to the hurdles to a relay. And generally he's a winner.

Dils earned All-American recognition last March during the NCAA Indoor Championships by running fifth in the 440-yard dash with a :48.94 clocking around the boards. Earlier, he had won the 600 in the Central Collegiate Conference Championships.

Last May in the Mid-American Conference Championships, Dils led his team to the title by accounting for one of its two first places by winning the intermediates.

His junior year is promising to be just as good, if not a great deal better, than his sophomore.

He has already qualified for the second straight time for the hurdles in the indoor national championships this March at Cobo Hall. He ran a :07.24 in the 60-meter highs in the National CYO Games on the Maryland campus earlier this month where he got another opportunity to see one of the best at this event.

Dils ran against Maryland's Renaldo Nehemiah. They faced each other in a preliminary heat. The Maryland athlete went-on to run a :07.02, the fastest 60-meter highs ever.

"I need more practice," Dils says. "I was surprised with my time. I didn't think it was that good. I should be able to do better than that."

In some respects, Dils may be a better athlete than Nehemiah. The


latter can earn his keep by merely running hurdle races while the former has a versatility of immeasurable importance to the entire team.

"Jeff can run anything," Parks says. "He can run the 220, 300, 440, 500 and 600. Heck, we even used him as a high jumper his freshman year. He went 6-3 and scored points for us in some meets."

Dils is part of a great one-two punch for Eastern in the hurdles. At the same CYO meet, Kevin Jackson qualified for the nationals but he pulled up lame in a workout soon after returning to Bowen.

Dils attended high school down in Ohio, Trotwood Madison, to be more precise. Since his graduation from high school, the Dils family has moved to Chelsea.

His younger brothers, Jeff and Gary, are the starting guards on the Chelsea High basketball team and form part of their older brother's cheering section. MY

EMU tracksters limp into

The Huron men's track squad will travel to Normal, Ill. for the 53rd Annual Central Colliegate Conference (C.C.C.) indoor track championships this weekend at Illinois State University, but they'll be at less than full strength for this key seasonal showdown.

Hard-pressed to make a run at the team championship is the way head coach Bob Parks sees it, "We've got a lot of people out: Barry Summers (injured weightman), Scott Ferguson (distance runner), Mike Helms, Kevin Young, and Erik Henriksen (all ailing middle distance runners) are out of action."

Last winter, the Hurons were runner-ups in the team race to Big Ten power Michigan. In Eastern's 10 years of participation for the title, the lowest they have finished is fourth. Threats for the 1979 team championship will be Michigan, Southern Illinois, Air Force, Wisconsin, Illinois State, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh, and Mid-American Conference rivals Western Michigan, Bowling Green, Toledo, Central Michigan and Kent State.

NOTABLY ABSENT from the competition will be Penn. State, who has placed in the top three teams the last three years. The Nittany Lions have, decided against making the trip. "It's probably between U-M and Southern Illinois for first, but Illinois State, Air Force and Wisconsin are all good," said Parks. The meet will be held on ISU's 200-meter tartan track and will feature 'a new look. "All the events are going to be metric this year, with the exception of the one, two and three mile runs. The relays will also, be in metric distances," added Parks. In the sprints, Eastern's Keith Bailey has a shot at placing high in both the 60 and 300. Billy Ray, Tony Cadogan and Keith Griffith are all contenders in the 400. Ray placed sixth last year in the event. Jeff Dils, the defending champion n the 600, is out to repeat, and Ben Gibson could be a factor in the scoring. Dils also placed fourth in the 60-yard high hurdles, and Kevin

Jackson, last year's runner-up in that event, will be competing despite an injury which has held him out of the last five meets. "Keven's going to be running for the first time in a month," noted Parks.

FOURTH IN the 880 in '78, Craig Gully returns to compete in the 800-meter run. Jerry Wojtala and Maurice Weaver are likely in the 1000. Weaver was second last year. They'll have some tough competition, however, Parks emphasizes two events, "The half 800 and the 1000 are the two toughest events in the meet."

Roger Jones, who took the mile in 1978, defeating a top-notch field, is out to qualify for the NCAA meet. "It won't be easy to repeat," said Parks, with another star-studded field set for

this year's meet.

With injurie's to Ferguson and Tony LaMay, Parks concedes that, ''we really don't have that much in distances above the mile.''

Relay-wise, Parks commented, "The two mile relay is right in the middle of the program so it tends to be light. In both the mile relay and the distance medley relay, everyone's good." Last year, the Hurons took the two mile relay and were second in the mile relay.

STEVE ELLIOTT is the two-time defending champion in the high jump and this time the junior will lead EMU's field event hopes. "Again, it'll be hard to repeat. Michigan's Mike Lattnay has gone 7'2", but. Steve beat some top jumpers last year too." Terry Thames and Ray Washington are threats in the long and triple jumps. "We could get some points there," predicted Parks. Gary Bastien, primarily a decathlon man, could score in the pole vault.

' With the NCAA Indoor Championships at Detroit's Cobo Hall looming just three weeks away, the Hurons look to qualify some personnel this weekend. The mile relay, Bailey in the 60, Dils and Gibson in the 600, Gully, Wojtala and Weaver in the 880 or 1000, Jones in the mile, and Elliott in the high jump are the prime candidates.

いたいたい しょうちょうけん たいしょう しんてい なたし 気に 一緒の ぬようし The Eastern Michigan track team proved once again that it is hard to keep a good man (or team) down by overcoming huge odds to win the 1979 Central Collegiate Indoor Track Championship in Horton Field House at Illinois State University. The Hurons, supposedly down and out because of injuries and other factors, fought back to win the coveted title. And the second start and set and share and share and

The Hurons, who had previously won titles in 1971, 1974, and 1975, and who had been second in 1972, 1973, 1977, and 1978, were not to be denied this time, as they avenged losses to Big-10 Champion Michigan (their neighbor six miles away) the past two years. Eastern, a charter member of the CCC since the 1920's, had dropped out for a few years, re-joining again in 1970 and finishing 4th that year and 3rd in 1976, a rather impressive string the past ten years (4-lsts; 4-2nds; 1-3rd; and • 1-4th) against most of the best teams in the midwest. Injuries had depleted the Hurons' ranks as Mike Helms and Kevin Young (2nd and 3rd

in MAC 1500 last spring and 4:05 & 4:06 milers), Erik Henriksen (4:08 last year in HS), along with Scott Ferguson (4th in MAC 10,000 meter last spring) were all out with injuries. Barry Summers, probably the best all-around weightman in EMU history and fellow thrower Ernie Demarse were both also out. In addition, eligibility losses cost EMU their top sprinter (the defending CCC 60 champ) in December. The crowning touch was when the three top long and triple jumpers missed the bus for the trip to Illinois State.

Coach Bob Parks actually gave his squad very little chance to vin. He did figure their only chance was to do it with what he called "big points". In other words a lot of firsts and seconds. He knew his team couldn't do it with 5ths and 6ths. They got their big points with five firsts, three seconds, and two thirds.

Things started out right on Friday as the Hurons took the first day lead with 27 points. They also had ten individual qualifiers for the finals on Saturday. The distance medley team got it going right in the first final event on Friday with a stirring victory. Craig Gully came in very close in 3rd on the leadoff 800, Tony Cadogan took over the lead on the 400, and Maurice Weaver and Roger Jones increased it on the final 1200 and 1600 legs. Steve Elliott's 2nd in the high jump was expected, but Greg Joseph's 2nd in the triple jump was not. The senior, normally 3rd man in his event, went over a foot further than he ever had to pick up eight big points. Another senior, Jeff Cekovich, also threw his personal best in the 35 lb. weight to add a point for 6th place.

The first event on Saturday really turned the tide. Roger Jones successfully defended his mile title as expected, but teammate Jerry Wojtata was right on his heels in 2nd place, and that was not expected. Wojtala's time was over two seconds better than his previous best. The Hurons really came to life with this one. Handslapping and rhythmic cheers became the order of the day. Not to be out-done, Jeff Dils won a close one in the high hurdles (the next event) and the Hurons were on their way.

Eastern did not load their two mile relay, but the unit of two milers, a 440 man, and one regular did the job, placing 5th and earning two points. Anchorman Craig Gully came from eighth place on the final lap as he ran his best split ever. The meet was virtually clinched in the 400 meter dash, the next event. Michigan had three men in the 10-man final and the Hurons one, Billy Ray. Ray, one of the slower qualifiers, went out hard, got the lead and held on to win as his teammates chanted "Bill-lee, Bill-lee, Bill-lee Ray, Bill-lee Ray." The three Michigan runners failed to place and the Eastern team was on its way.

Keith Bailey, one of the more spirited members of the team, showed the way on the track as well as with his cheers as he placed 5th in the 55 meter dash in his best time, then returned for a 3rd place in the 300 meter dash as the two Michigan entrants scratched. Dils then ran away with the 500 meter dash in 1:02.4, the 5th fastest time ever run in the histroy of the world, as he also qualified for the NCAA 600.2 Start a line and the first of the start of Jerry Wojtala, on a double from the mile, put on a torrid last lap to finish 3rd . . . in the 1000 meter run. The final scoring for the day came on an anti-climactic 6th place in the mile relay, highlighted by Jeff Dils 47.9 anchor leg. Some pushing, showing, and fouls had cost the Hurons a higher place in the event, but at that point, it really didn't matter. And ray for and the assistance of a second Dils was named the meet's outstanding performer for his double wins and fine relay leg. The senior from Trotwood, Ohio Madison had won the 600 a year ago but had only placed 4th in the high hurdles. This time he won his double. 

A letdown was in order for the Hurons after claiming the Central Collegiate Conference team championship last weekend, and they experienced a slight one Friday evening at the Wolverine Invitational. Held in the University of Michigan's Track and Tennis Building, the meet's time schedule was thrown off by over a hour because of a lack of adequate time to complete the 60-yard dash preliminary heats. All this didn't bother Jeff Dils and Jerry Wojtala, the squad's senior co-captains, as they blazed to personal bests in their respective events. Dils, who has already qualified for the NCAA Bidoor Championships at Detroit's Cobostfalls in the 60-yard high-hurdles and 600-yard dash, won the 440-yard dash in an electronically timed 48:04, qualifying him for the NCAA meet in that event as well.

Wojtala, the CCC runner-up in the one mile run, took first in that event Friday, clocking another personal best with a 4:06.99 effort. Hanging back and kicking with 300-yards to go, Wojtala sprinted the final 220 to overtake the field.

Eastern's shuttle hurdle relay team of Art Doran, Gary Bastien, Kevin Jackson and Dils took second in 29.1 to U.-N.'s 28.8. The two mile relay unit of Varick Tucker, Wojtala, Walt White and Mark Giblin was also second, and the mile relay team with Keith Bailey, Tony Cadogan, Ben Gibson and Dils placed third in 3.18.59.

Third in the 880-yard run was Craig Gully with his 1:54.13 timing. Frosh Norman Graham, a sprinter from Flint Southwestern, placed second in the 300-yard dash at 31.1 Keith Griffith was fifth (31.5), and Mark Gardner sixth (31.8) in the same event.

Jackson and Chuck Love grabbed sixth place finishes, as Jackson ran 7.57 in the 60-yard high hurdle finals and Love clocked 2:16.7 in the 1000-yard run. Greg Joseph's 46'11'' effort in the triple jump earned him a third.

Dils fourth in 440 at NCAA meet

By AP and Press Staff DETROIT — Eastern Michigan's Jeff Dils finished fourth Friday in the 440-yard dash in the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships at Cobo Hall.

Dils ran a :49.96 for his fourth place while his qualifying time was :48.96 which was the second was show for the crowd and for fastest time going into the finals.

Dils also qualified for Saturday's final in the 600-yard dash with the second fastest time in the prelims of 1:10.73.

Eastern's distance medley relay qualified for the finals with a time of 9:55.19 which was also the second fastest time in the prelims.

Running on the team were Craig Gully, Billy Ray, Maurice Weaver and Roger Jones.

While Eastern was faring well in the meet it was Renaldo Nehemiah that was stealing the show.

Nehemiah, refusing to take it easy in a race he did not even have to run hard, lowered his meet record in the 60-yard high hurdles to 6.94 seconds.

"After what happened last week, I learned my lesson," the 19-year-old Nehemiah said, alluding to the IC4A championships in which he embarrassingly missed the final hurdle in a heat and was disqualified, ending his 16-meet, two-year winning streak.

"I'm hungry for a race," added the University of Maryland sophomore, the world's top-ranked hurdler. "This is my last indoor meet this season and I want to put on a show for the crowd and for myself."

There was no question that he put on an exciting show for the crowd of more than 8,000 at Cobo Arena.

In the first trial heat leading up to Saturday's semifinals and finals, Nehemiah shattered the meet record of 7.11 he had shared with former Lousiaina State hurdler Larry Shipp with a clocking of 7.08.

One hour later, in a quarterfinal race — in which all four ' runners were automatically to advance to the semifinals — Nehemiah went all out in becoming the first athlete in meet history to go under seven seconds in the hurdles.

"I'm going for an (indoor) record in tomorrow's race," he said. He set the indoor best of 6.89 earlier this year.

Nehemiah's glittering performances overshadowed Friday's seven individual finals and the battle for the team championship.

Texas El Paso, the co-favorite with Villanova for the team title, got a big boost when sophomore Michael Musyoki of Kenya coasted to victory in the threemile run in 13:21.6 — the slowest time in the six-year history of the event in the meet.

Villanova wins indoor track title; Dils grabs two places for Hurons

DETROIT (AP) — Villanova's swift mile relay team won the final running event Saturday and captured its third title in the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships, edging Texas-El Paso by one point despite victories in the mile and twomile by the Miners' Sulemin Nyambui.

The Miners' chances of

repeating as champions and winning their fifth title in the past six years were thwarted in the two-mile relay when they were disqualified after finishing second.

Eastern Michigan finished tied for 20th with nine points, most accumulated by Jeff Dils, who finished fourth in the 440-yard dash Friday and placed sixth in Saturday's 600-yard run.

EMU's other points were turned in by its distance medley relay team of Craig Gully, Billy Ray, Maurice Weaver and Roger Jones, who finished fourth.

Villanova, which began the


final program of the two-day competition with only two points compared to Texas-El Paso's 27, wound up with 52 points to the Miners' 51.

In addition to the mile relay, the Wildcats picked up points on victories by Don Paige in the 1,000, Anthony Tufariello in 600, the 2-3 finish of Sydney Maree and Amos Korir in the mile, and a third in the distance medley.


However, they still needed a victory in the mile relay, run in two sections. Winning in the second section, the Wildcats were faced with beating the time of 3 minutes, 16.07 seconds turned in by first place Kansas in the opening section.

Hurons place at NCAA championships

DETROIT-The Hurons scored in three events and five runners earned All-America recognition at the NCAA Indoor Track Championships held this weekend in Cobo Arena.

Run on a 160-yard (eleven laps to the mile) banked board track, more strategy and racing tactics were necessary to run fast times and place high than on the usual 220-yard flat synthetic indoor surfaces.

Friday evening, 'Jeff Dils, the Huron's senior co-captain and now three-time /All-American, placed fourth in the 440-yard dash in 49.06 seconds. The native of Trotwood, Ohio-improved on his fifth place finish in last year's meet. He went out, relatively slow, however, in his heat, and was boxed in while attempting to pass. Dils commented, "I got cut off twice and I was still fourth. I think I could've won it. I made one mistake, though, I tried to pass on the inside.

IN ADDITION to his performance in the 440 final Friday night, Dils had to run qualifying heats in both the 440 and 600 yard dashes in the afternoon. Dils ran the second fastest time of the afternoon in the 600 yard heats, and was in good position for the finals on Saturday. aturday. Also qualifying for the finals

Saturday was the Huron distance medley relay team of Craig Gully, Billy Ray, Maurice Weaver and Roger ·lones.

Jerry Wojtala, who had blazed a 2:09.24 in the 1,000-yard run just last week at the Mid-American Conference Invitational, failed to qualify for

- Saturday's final in the event. The Senior from Trenton clocked 2:11.56. placing fourth in his preliminary heat. Behind from the outset, he made a couple of quick advances to the front of the pack, but was held off. Bearing Craig Gully led off the contingent with down on the backstretch, he made a final attempt but the spurt fell short.

600 final Saturday, Dils hung back and tried to kick with 1 1/2 laps remaining. He gained some ground on all of his opponents, except eventual champion Anthony Tufariello of Villanova, but struggled in through the last 80 yards, obviously tired and drained from his three tough races Friday Finishing in 1:10.78, good for sixth place, he had this to say, "In the 600, I was just tired. I. didn't know I was that tired till Lgot in the race."

COMMENTING ON Dils' performances, Huron head coach Bob Parks said, "When you're racing on board tracks against good competition, there's only one way to do it (win), and that's to get out ahead. Jeff. ran out of gas in the 600 because he ran 612 yards, following the leaders in lane two or three the whole way, and then trying to swing wide and kick."

Parks went on to say that Dils now becomes only the second man in the history of the NCAA Indoor Championships to place in both the 440 and 600 dashes in the same meet.

Seeded as the sixth-fastest team of the seven qualifying units, the Huron distance medley relay squad ended up fourth, but with only a half-second separating them from second place. a 1:55.8 leg over the 880-yard distance, and the Green and White Running in the first section of the were in good position.

Running the 440-yard leg, was Billy Ray, a junior from Toledo. He clocked 50.2 to keep the Hurons in the thick of things. Weaver, falling behind initial- ' Churchill, running in his last indoor ly on the 3/4 mile-leg, kicked in with a 2.58.2 split, putting Eastern in fourth place going into the final leg.

ROGER JONES, running the mile anchor leg, held his position for two laps, then moved into third. With four laps to go he charged into the lead, but was overtaken by Keith Young of All-America status for the five Tennessee and began to fall back. Still within two stops of second at the the outdoor season in just two weeks, final lap, he kicked and held fourth place to the tape, recording a time of 4:05.9.


Summarizing the team's performance, Jones said, "It was a big chance for us to look good, and we did. But I just feel like I didn't let it out, and I should've gone with those guys (who kicked with two laps remaining)?" Weaver commented on running the boards, "Indoor running is really hard. 1 27 24 20 2 Eastern Michigan's men's track team had a great indoor season in 1979. Despite a number of injuries and several other problems, the Hurons stretched their unbeaten string to 54 in a row, won the prestigious C.C.C. title and placed in three events in the NCAA meet. Besides these accomplishments they also broke a number of meets, had many outstanding performances and placed well in all the major meets.

The Sophomores won the annual Inter-Class Meet with 123 points to 114 for the Freshman, 83 for the Seniors and 71 for the Juniors. Double-vinners were: Keith Bailey (60-6.3;300-31.1), Gary Bastien (Pentathlon-3501;PV-15'0"), Jeff Dils (65HH-7.7;440-49.6), Roger Jones (880-1:55.9; Mile-4:11.0) Ray Mashington (TJ-46'2 3/4"; LJ-21'4 3/4"). Other winners were: Dan McClory-3 Mile, Jeff Cekovich-35 lb wt., Bob Church-Steeplechase, Ernie Demarse-Shot Put, Steve Elliott-High Jump, Tony Cadogan-600, Craig Gully-1000 and Tony LaMay-Two Mile.

Coach Bob Parks flew to Washington D.C. with nine of his top athletes for the National CYO Meet in nearby College Park, Maryland and the Hurons ran very well. Jeff Dils and Kevin Jackson both ran NCAA qualifying times (7.24 and 7.32) in their heats of the 60 yd. high hurdles, but did not qualify for the finals, won by Renaldo Nehemiah in world-record time. The two top hurdlers and two top 880 men will be gone, but most of the other top men will return, Coaches Bob Parks, Al Pingel and Larry Steeb feel that, with a few breaks the 1980 edition could be EMU's best ever.

Huron cindermen run to first place at Ohio U. relay meet

ATHENS—The Hurons won four of the seven featured relay events and took second in two others to dominate that portion of the 17th Annual Ohio University Relays here on Friday and Saturday. Jeff Dils added an individual victory in the 110-meter high hurdles and Barry Summers a new varsity record in the shot put to cap a successful weekend. Overcast skies and cool temperatures in the middle made conditions less than ideal, coupled with the fact that the meet's time schedule was nearly one hour behind.


Opening the meet with a comefrom-behind, second-place finish in the 6400-meter relay (approximately 4 x 1 mile), the team of Mark Giblin, Kevin Young, Craig Gully (4:17.6), and Jerry Wojtala'(4:18.3) ran 17:20.6 co to finish behind Cleveland State's contingent. Gully and Wojtala moved the Hurons up from sixth place with their efforts. That was followed by a victory in the distance medley relay, as John Putz and Maurice Weaver ran spirited legs to open up a big lead for 'EMU anchorman Roger Jones. Combining for a 10:00.0 clocking, Varick Tucker led off with a 1:57.0 800-meter leg, followed by Putz' 48.2 in the 400 meters. Weaver responded with a-3:00.7 on the 1200 portion, and Jones finished up in 4:13.9 for the 1600meter leg.

Eastern again found themselves runner-up to Cleveland State, this time in the 3200-meter relay (approximately 4 x half mile). Giblin led off, and Gully, on the second leg, blazed a 1:52.8 to pull the Hurons to the fore. Jones (1:56.9) and Wojtala finished off the unit as they totaled 7:49.1.

THE SPRINTERS took to the track in the 400-meter relay, and the Green and White, despite subpar handoffs, finished a close second to Western Michigan. Dils, Keith Griffith, Mark Gardner and Keith Bailey clocked 41.53 in the event, with Western first in 41.39.

Next, the Huron spring medley foursome battled with the leaders throughout, finally settling for third place. Ben Gibson hit 49.4 on the first leg, and 200-meter man Bailey (21.8) and Kevin Jackson (21.9) handed off even with Western Michigan. Weaver, despite a 1:52.3 anchor leg for the 800 meters, was passed by Western's Jack McIntosh, who turned in a fine 1:49.8 split.

Billy Ray, Griffith, Gardner and Bailey brought the Hurons home first place honors in the 800-meter relay, clocking 1:27.5 to win comfortably over Hillsdale College, second in $1:2^{\circ}$

Keeping that winning streak intact,? the Hurons won the last two relays as well. The shuttle hurdle squad of Art Doran, Gary Bastien, Jackson and Dils topped the timbers collectively in 59.42, defeating Western Michigan.

ENDING THE afternoon was the 1600-meter relay, with Dils' swift 46.2 anchor leg the highlight. Ray led off in 48.6, Gibson added an identical 48.6, and Griffith countered with a 49.4. Their 3:12.56 overall timing, bested second-place Ohio U.'s 3:14.84.

Individually, Summers' 53-31/2 EMU varsity record in the shot put landed him fourth place. Dils tri umphed in the hurdles with a time of 14.2. Teammate Kevin Jackson' was third at 14.4.

EMU sophomore Dave Gravender came up with some good performances on his second day in the decathlon competition, finishing third with 6,438 points. His marks included personal bests in the 1500 meters (4:26.8), pole vault (13'0''), and javelin (137'0'').

Huron trackmen bark loud at Dogwood

KNOXVILLE, Tenn.—EMU decathlete Gary Bastien won his specialty and Jeff Dils qualified for the NCAA meet in the 110-meter high hurdles to lead the Hurons at last weekend's Dogwood Relays held here at the University of Tennessee. Bastien's point total of 6,979 bested the second place finisher by nearly 200 points. The first seven events were held despite a driving rainstorm,

which finally cleared up Friday afternoon. Dils placed third in the open hurdle race at 13.7 seconds, equaling the NCAA outdoor championships standard.

High jumper Steve Elliott tied for first in Friday's open high jump, clearing 6'8'', Jim Lotan, an EMU student competing unattached, won the open pole vault, soaring 15'8''. The Hurons also placed'in the shuttle hurdle relay, as Art Doran, Bastien, Kevin Jackson (14.4), and Dils (14.3) teamed up and turned in a 59.2

Trackmen Out To Win Third Consecutive MAC Title

The Eastern Michigan men's track team will attempt to win its third consecutive Mid-American Conference track championship this year but unlike the previous two years the Hurons will get a chance to win the title before the home fans.

Eastern is the host for the 1979 MAC Spring Championships in track, tennis and golf. The 10 league schools will converge on Ypsilanti May 17-19 to determine league champions in three sports. Coach Bob Parks' Huron men captured the 1977 league title at Ohio University and last year the Hurons won the championship at Central Michigan. Eastern also won the crown in 1974 at Kent State.

This time around it will be contested in the friendly confines of Olds-Marshall Track in Rynearson, Stadium and Parks feels Eastern, Western and Miami

EIGHT SELECTED

will be strong contenders for the title.

Eastern won the '78 title with 156 points to 106 for second-place Central Michigan but the Hurons had just two individual champions in that meet.

Hurdler Jeff Dils won the 110meter high hurdles in :13.94 last year while Gary Bastien won the league decathlon title in a meet record 7,210 points.

Both Dils and Bastien are back to attempt to repeat as champions in those events with Dils also trying for the 400-meter intermediate hurdle championship, where he placed second last year, and also as a member of possibly two relay teams.

The Hurons will need plenty of firepower in the meet as Western Michigan, Miami and Ball State all loom as serious contenders for the title.

Eastern has beaten both

Western Michigan (93-70) and Central Michigan $(97 \ 1/2-60 \ 1/2)$ in dual meets this season.

In the Western Michigan meet the Hurons had 12 individual wins and against Central the Hurons won 11 events. Dils was the standout performer in both the dual meets. Against Western he won the 400-meter intermediate hurdles, the 110meter high hurdles, and ran on the winning 440-yard relay team. In the CMU meet Dils won the 100meters, the 110-meter hurdles, the 400-intermediate hurdles and ran on the winning 400-meter relay team.

Bastien won the decathlon at the Dogwood this year and finished second at the Florida Relays.



Instead he returned to East Lansing to try to reconstruct the pieces after his Michigan State track team was demolished by EMU, 108-37, at-Olds-Marshall track.

"I'm very disappointed," he said. "I'm sorry we couldn't have made it better for the alumni."

Several track alumni witnessed the meet but had little more to do than trade memories and ready themselves for the post-meet alumni get-together after it became apparent the undermanned Spartans

would be no match for the Hurons. Some excitement was salvaged for the crowd by the Huron women's track team, which ran its EMU Invitational simultaneously.

The Hurons nipped Ball State 60-54 for the team title when their mile relay team of Debbie Mullice, Lydia Yanik, Nancy Gavoor and Betsy Riccardi ran away from the sixteam field in the final event of the day.

Western Michigan (35), Hillsdale (16), Kalamazoo College (12) and Macomb Community College (10) rounded out the field.

The man responsible for mustering the juggernaut which demolished the Spartans was Bibbs' former EMU teammate, Bob Parks. The two ran in the late 1940s and early 1950s:


Parks showed some compassion



Size doesn't hinder this long leaper

Derek Harper might be one of the smallest of the most outstanding high school track athletes in the state, but the Pontiac Northern star is gifted with speed to burn and a pair of springy legs.

The 5-foot-8, 140-pound junior powerpack started off the season by winning the long jump at the Mansfield (Ohio) Relays with a leap of 23 feet, 9¼ inches.

And although he hasn't bettered that distance — the peak in the state this year - he has surpassed 23 feet in two other meets.

Most impressively, Harper fourtimes soared beyond 23 feet in a dual meet against Farmington High, winning on a 23-6 effort.

"Harper probably would have eventually exceeded his Mansfield distance in the dual season if the weather had been better," said veteran Coach Tony Pizza, associated with prep track for 31 years.

"Most of our dual meets have been on Saturdays and it seems as if we've had five weeks of cold or rainy weather - not very conducive conditions for a strong Harper performance. When Harper turned in his effort at Mansfield, Pontiac Northern finished 18th overall in a field of some 250 teams."

HARPER'S LONG-JUMP victories have been an inspiration to his teammates. Pontiac Northern finished second to Mt. Clemens in the Oxford meet and was third in

Harper is a five letter-winner, with three in track and two as a running back in football.

Two years ago, as a freshman, Harper displayed his potential in winding up seventh in the state Class A long jump finals with a leap of 22 feet, 10 inches. Last year Harper finished third at 23 feet, 3 inches.

Primed for 8 MAC races Iron man's pure gold for EMU

YPSILANTI — Jeff Dils may be such a good hurdler that he'll represent the United States this summer in the Pan-American Games and next year in the Moscow Olympics.

But we won't know if there's one golden race in him until he quits running eight like an iron man.

That's Dils' assignment today and tomorrow — eight races — as he tries to lead Eastern Michigan to the Mid-American Conference track title.

"They won't be as hard as the four I ran in the NCAA indoor meet in March," he said. "The high hurdles and 100-meter dash are really fun races, not work.

"I look forward to being able to run just what I want to, but I'm not upset about spreading myself thin here." 1. Carlo

HE PLACED fourth in the 440 and sixth in the 600 at the NCAA indoor meet in Detroit, the only runner to attempt that double this year.

"At Cobo Arena I ran the 440 trial and final and the 600 trial on Friday and I still felt good," he said. "But when I came back for the 600 final Saturday I had nothing left. I never knew I could be so tired.

"This weekend won't be that bad. I just hope the championship doesn't come down to the 1.600 relay. I plan to be pretty tired by then, and that's my pressure race. The meet can depend on it, like two weeks ago when we had to beat Michigan State in the relay to win our dual meet."

"I hate to run Dils and Roger Jones to death," EMU Coach Bob Parks said. "But I'm afraid we need the points to win.'

'IN LAST NIGHT'S only final event, Jones ran the fastest 10,000 meters of his career and still got only a fifth place for Eastern Michigan.

Bowling Green's Bob Lunn and Pete Murtaugh took first and second, with Lunn's winning time of 29:55.30 being 16¹/₂ seconds better than the old conference record. Jeff Zylstra, the 1978 champion from Western Michigan, didn't even enter in anticipation of the burning pace. Zylstra will run the steeplechase, in which he also is defending champion, and the 5000

DILS IS scheduled for three preliminaries today — in the 100, 110 high hurdles and 400 intermediate hurdles. Assuming that he qualifies. he'll have finals in all three tomorrow plus a leg of the 400-meter and 1,600-meter relays.

Jones is entered in the 5,000- and 10,000-meter runs and the 3,000-meter steeplechase, three long races in three days.

Dils is defending champion in the high hurdles and has the best times in the intermediates. He placed second in that race last year and it probably will become his specialty. In size, strength, speed and versatility he is compared sometimes to Mike Shine, the 1976 Olympic silver medalist.

"My favorite race is the high hurdles," Dils said. "If I could compete in them at a high level, that's what I'd do. But everyone tells me I have a better chance in the intermediates.

"MY ELIGIBILITY runs out this

year, but I'll stay at Eastern next year to train and complete my degree' in management. I hope I can get invitations to some meets."

Dils is casual not only about his eight-race weekend, but also about what he'll do the rest of the summer. "I'm just learning about the

opportunities after that," he said.

DILS HAS been competing in a flock of events since high school, but he was pretty much of a find for Eastern. At Trotwood, Ohio, just outside Dayton, he did the high and low hurdles, high jumped, long jumped, ran on the mile relay team and sometimes the 440 and 880 relays. He placed fourth in the high hurdles at the state meet.

"Our star was Lamar Preyor, who was state 100 and 220 champion and ran a 47.7 quarter," he said.

Prevor went to Tennessee but he has been set back by leg injuries after a great start. Dils has gotten

that he became eligible for in-state tuition. Dils' father moved to Ann Arbor as part owner of a typographics firm. Jeff works there part-time running a camera and typsetting machine.

For all his victories, Dils is not a picture-perfect hurdler.

"MOST HURDLERS do a lot of drills at less than full speed," Parks said. "But Jeff drags his trail leg all wrong. He's so bad in the drills that we don't do them. But at full speed he snaps his leg over the hurdle just the way he should, so we have him do everything at full speed."

It works.

In the intermediates, Dils takes 14 steps between hurdles, which means, that he alternates hurdling with his left and right legs. Dils is still, learning to do it with both legs equally well. It's difficult, but John Akii-Bua, the 1972 Olympic champion and former record holder, also used 14 steps.

Ticked-off Hearns out to nail Weston

LAS VEGAS - Harold Weston is a slicker of a fighter who learned his trade on the streets of New York.

That means, in boxing terms, that he is savvy. And Weston says he is going to be the teacher who teaches Thomas Hearns the ins and outs of the boxing business. the subtle little tricks.

"For the first time, Thomas is ticked off at somebody," said Emmanuel Steward, the manager and maneuverer of Thomas Hearns.

Bob Parks recalculating after 2nd lackluster day

By RICK SHERWOOD Press Sports Writer Seldom has Bob Parks looked so concern.

Confident before competition began that his Eastern Michigan track team would capture its third consecutive Mid-American Conference track and field championship, Parks was doing some hasty recalculating after a second less-than-exceptional day of action in the three-day affair at EMU's Olds-Marshall Track.

"It doesn't look real good," Parks said, after a false start, a drop-out and a no-show cut into EMU's potential point total Friday. "It'll be close but we're not going to blow anybody off and we're not going to get above 120 points."

The agony was tempered with a touch of ecstasy, however, when sophomore Gary Bastien captured his second straight decathlon title in record fashion and qualified for the NCAA nationals with a 7,440 point total.

And, iron man Jeff Dils lived up to expectations by qualifying for today's finals in the 110meter high hurdles, the 100meter dash and the 400-meter intermediate hurdles. He won each of his heats and will defend his MAC title in the intermediate hurdles.

In all, 14 Huron runners qualified for finals action, leaving Parks cautiously optimistic. Miami, which Parks figured to be the Hurons' toughest opponent, advanced only five runners in preliminary



Section B action Friday but eight other finals, with no preliminaries, are

scheduled today. "It'll take a good day to win it," Parks' said. "We can probably pick up some points in the field events 'but the high jump and 1,500-meter run are really crucial events for us."

Western Michigan, with a 1-2-4 finish in the 3,000-meter steeplechase, a second in the decathlon and a third in the hammer throw, moved into a tie for first place with Central Michigan, which was bolstered by a 3-4-5 finish in the shot put, with 24 points after Friday's finals.

Bowling Green, which captured all its points in Thursday's 10,000-meter run, dropped to second with 18 markers while the Hurons moved up to fifth with 17 points.

Ohio (16), Kent State (13), Ball State (9), Toledo (4) and Northern Illinois (0) followed.

EMU's major problems Friday began when Tony Cadogan false started in the 400meter dash. Then, distance ace Roger Jones dropped out of the 3,000-meter steeplechase. And, the Hurons most consistent leaper, Ray Washington, failed to show for the long jump competition.

Parks had figured each for points.


However, Kevin Young, Maurice Weaver and Jerry Wojtala all qualified for the 1,500-meter run finals while Kevin Jackson will join Dils in the high hurdle finals, both events in which Miami was blanked.

Keith Bailey and Billy Ray made the grade in the 100 dash while Ben Gibson and Keith Griffith will challenge in the 400 dash. Craig Gully. and Norm Graham were EMU's only qualifiers in the 800 and 200 events, respectively, while John Putz will test the field in the intermediate hurdles.

Bastien turned in the performance of the day to win the decathlon. The 168-pound sophomore carried a slender lead into the final five events of the day but fell behind Western Michigan's Mike Bishop after the second event Friday.

However, Bastien recaptured the lead with a 14-11¼ effort in the pole vault, despite a nerveracking delay when teammate Dave Gravinder, who was warming up for the javelin competition, accidently speared Ball State decathlete Ken Bodnar. Bodnar was treated and released from a local hospital.

"It was so scary," Bastien said. "I almost felt like dropping out." Gravinder and Ball State's (See MAC, Page 2B)



Now recruiting is not unusual for the highly successful Eastern Michigan track coach but when it comes in the midst of the EMU-hosted Mid-American Conference Track and Field championships, something's up.

In Parks' mind it may have served as a premonition for his Huron squad stumbled severely Saturday in its quest for a third consecutive MAC crown and finished fourth with a mere $78\frac{1}{2}$ points, one half the total they amassed last year while running away with the title.

"I've never seen a meet where more things went wrong," Parks sighed.

While something was going wrong for the Hurons in nearly each of the 16 final events held at EMU's Olds-Marshall Track Saturday, nearly everything was going right for 1979 champion Miami.

"On paper we had to have some help through the middle (the 800-meter run, the 1,500meter run and the 3,000-meter steeplechase) and we got it," the Redskin's MAC Track Coach of the Year Chuck Zody said. "Our 1-2 in the high jump and 2-3 in the discus sewed things up. We're a strong field events team and we felt we had enough quality in the

running events to back it up." Miami totaled 113 points to whip runnerup Western Michigan (94). Central Michigan (92), Eastern Michigan and Ohio University (63) rounded out the top five.

Bowling Green (51), Toledo (46), Kent State (40), Northern Illinois (40) and Ball State (33¹/₂) rounded out the second division in the three-day affair.

Had it not been for senior standout Jeff Dils, the Hurons effort would have been strictly second division.

The 6-foot-2, 180-pound iron man capped a brilliant four-year career by winning the 110-meter high hurdles and 400-meter intermediate hurdle events, running the first leg of EMU's winning. 400-meter relay team, sprinting to a third place in the 100-meter dash and anchoring the Hurons' fourth place 1,600-

meter relay team. Dils scored 29½ points alone, best of any athlete in the meet, and ran with hardly any rest between events.

"He was just super," Parks said. "It's a little bit of a letdown

that we finished fourth," Dils said. "I would have liked to have gone out with three straight championships but individually

I'm pretty happy." Dils accounted for five of the eight places the Hurons managed in running finals Saturday but could not contribute in the areas in which EMU needed the most help.

Parks had anticipated Friday that the 1,500-meter run and the high jump would be crucial events. They were.

The Hurons placed three individuals in the 1,500 finals while

Miami was shut out. However, no Huron scored in the metric mile. And, when the Redskins went 1-2 in the high jump, it was curtains for the Hurons.

"The 1,500 killed us," Parks explained: "That was the dif-ference. We had to get some points there and we didn't.'

While Miami was soaring and the Hurons sinking, Western Michigan and Central Michigan zoomed into the title picture. The Broncos excelled in the distance races with Jack McIntosh's MAC record of 1:47.85 setting the pace. Central picked nearly a quarter of its points in field events with Curt Geerlings winning the pole vault in track record fashion and Dave Kielty taking the discus.

Ohio University's Jerome Hatfield set the only other MAC record on the hot and windy day when he won the triple jump competition with a $51-foot-10\frac{1}{2}$ leap.

Hatfield, who had won the long jump Friday, joined Dils and Bowling Green's Bob Lunn as the only double winners of the meet. Lunn added the 5,000-meter title Saturday, with a track record 14:32.51 clocking, to the 10,000-meter championship he earned Thursday.

The 5,000 was also the setting for the Hurons' biggest disap-pointment of the meet. Distance ace Roger Jones, who placed fifth in the 10,000-meter run Thursday but dropped out of the steeplechase Friday, led most of the way in the 5,000 before pulling out of the race with a

little more than four laps to go. "Jones only scored two points in the meet and I think he should have scored 20," Parks added. Other winners Saturday in-

cluded Miami's Richard Elkins (javelin) and Jaime White (high jump), Bowling Green's Steve Housley (1,500), Kent State's Terry Carter (100), Ohio's Jesse Young (200) and Toledo's 1,600meter relay team.

EMU's Gary Bastien, who set a MAC record and qualified for the NCAA nationals with 7,440 points in the decathlon Friday, was named the meet's outstanding performer by the MAC coaches.

EMU: It was a bad day at the races

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Dan McClory has covered track and cross country for. the Echo for the past two years. This is his analysis of why heavily-favored Eastern Michigan placed fourth in last weekend's Mid-American Conference men's track championships held on the EMU campus.)

Talk about having a bad day. Well, three bad days.

Heading into last weekend's Mid-American' Conference track championships here at Eastern, the Huron's were riding the crest of a perfect 7-0 dual meet season and were heavy favorites to extend their string 'of MAC titles to three in a row. After all, Eastern had never finished lower than second in the conference since joining the loop in 1973, so why should they start now? Sure, Miami and Western Michigan were contenders to be reckoned with, but even with the meet figured conservatively, the Green and White appeared to have it in the bag.

For three days 12-year veteran head coach Bob Parks scratched his head and kicked up enough dirt to fill the Grand Canyon as he watched his usually well-groomed and efficient unit sputter and stagger to a fourth place finish, scoring 781/2 points to finish behind champion Miami (113), runner-up Western Michigan (94) and third place finisher Central Michigan (92).

WHEN I SAT DOWN and figured out on paper exactly what went wrong, I had enough material to write a small novel. Starting Thursday with the decathlon, EMU sophomore Dave Gravender headed into the meet with the fifth best score in the conference. He false-started twice in the first event. To top off his hard-luck story, Gravender accidentally speared a decathlon competitor in the warm-ups for the javelin on Friday and was so shaken up by the experience that he failed to finish the meet.

Thursday evening, distance stalwart Roger Jones fell behind in the finals of the 10,000-meter run (6.2 miles), and finished in fifth place, a far cry from an anticipated runner-up spot. Truly the victim of a lackluster tracksters entered in the championweekend performance-wise, Jones dropped out of the steeplechase, leaving the Hurons with zero points in turn out this way for the Hurons, with an event that they had counted on placing in the top three. Saturday, Jones was racing in an event more his Rynearson Stadium's Olds-Marshall style, the 5,000-meter, but after a Track on Eastern's West Campus.

sophomore again dropped out of the mances by Eastern athletes that can't' race, and EMU again was shut out, this time in an event that they had counted on winning, since Iones had the best time in the MAC by fifteen varsity, MAC and Michigan collegiate seconds going into the meet.

The loss of a championship can't be blamed on two people, as they had plenty of help/from their teammates. Kevin Jackson failed to make the finals in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles and the senior who finished third in the event last year failed to score, disintegrating a potential second place finish this year. 400meter man Tony Cadogan, who placed fifth in the 1978 MAC meet, false-started in the preliminaries, failing to advance to the finals. Likewise Ben Gibson, the sixth place finisher last year, made the 400-meter final but placed a non-scoring seventh. Sprinters Keith Bailey and Billy Ray failed to make it to the finals in the 200-meter dash and the Hurons' potent 1,600-meter relay team finished a disappointing fourth, coming into the meet ranked second. Middle distance runners Maurice Weaver, Jerry Wojtala, and Kevin Young all made it to the 1,500-meter final, but none placed. Young and Weaver went 3-4 last year in the same event.

Long jumper/triple jumper Ray Washington didn't show for the meet, and could have probably placed in both events. Steve Elliott. the Huron's seven-foor high jumper, could clear only 6'834" and had to settle for fifth place. Decathlon winner Gary Bastien couldn't come up with any points for the Hurons in the pole vault and didn't make the high hurdles final either.

We make a push to put our shoes on the top athletes."

That's why Trumbull will be taking note of the champions at the meet who wear Adidas. It's a big year for the shoe companies because the Olympics are coming traceable to the role that America has placed on keepup next year.

Other brands are here, too, but none is more visible than Adidas. Athletes streamed in and out of the tent Thursday, taking advantage of a spike-changing service and checking out a table displaying the company's latest in footwear.

Spikes for the NCAA can be no longer than a quarter of an inch, and several athletes had to have them changed. "I oughta get combat pay for this, you know," Trumbull said, his hands sore from all the work.

"If we can get a Sports Illustrated cover showing our product," Trumbull said, "it's great advertising and it doesn't cost us a thing."

Trumbull, who describes himself as "a tired old jock who likes sports," has been with Vanco for five years. He once served as press secretary for former Michigan

'The Hambletonian is, without question, the showpiece of harness racing and any time you (a TV network sports

division) can add the most prestigous event in a sport to your schedule you

are delighted," Ohlmeyer said. "However, we are doubly proud to have the Hambletonian because we plan to present it as a highlight attraction on our first ever Saturday Sports World telecast."

Ohlmeyer said that St. Louio-based NBC sportscaster Jay Randolph will be one of the commentators and that schedule permitting, the final decisive heat will be televised live.

The Hambletonian has a unique racing format which requires the winning horse to capture two one-mile heats.



To all returning UN track team members: 1979:

I hope all of you are having a nice summer so far and are staying in shape. The summer season should not be a total vacation. Everyone should be sure to stay active, keep your weight down, stay in good physical condition, and try to better yourself. Other than the AJ guys, I don't think it is super-necessary for the others to train hard every day, but I do think that they should run regularly, possibly lift weights, and do stretching exercises. The summer is a time that you can improve. You probably can hit good performances too if you can find meets and are in shape to run in them. The weather is certainly better than it is during the spring. Coach Pingel and I are trying to get caught up from the past season and are getting ready for the coming year. We are also trying to wind up a long recruiting year. During the year we do not get to spend much time on recruiting due to our own season so it does drag into the summer and this year, it appears to be later than usual. We expect to fill a few holes and get some guys who can help immediately, but it is going slow. If any of you have run into any people over the summers who might be interested in EMU, don't hesitate to let us know.

All in all, we had a good year in 1978-79, but it did not end the way we would have liked. We extended our very long indoor string, won the indoor CCC meet, placed in 3 events at Cobe Hall, and generally did well indoors. Outdoors we upset W.Ky. then won all of our dual meets, but we started seeing some signs which alarned us and caused some concern going into the MAC meet. Inregular practice habits, people on their own wave-length in training, many people missing for one reason or another, inconsistant racing, none of which were very encouraging, but we kept thinking that we would come through great in the MAC meet just as we had the past two years. I figured the results, I felt quite conservatively and had us winning. Neryone thought I was an alarmist and being negative. Actually as it turned out I was quite optimistic. I felt that being at home would help us. Neryout think it hurt us. We had guys scattered all over the place, going about think it hurt us. Hend guys scattered all over the place, going about think it houses herdly anyone at the stadium except when they were going to run thenselves. Meanwhile, MAU, Miani, and CMU and the other schools, with nothing else to do were all at the stadium cheering their teannates. We were even busy administering the meet as the host school.

I felt that we would start off real well early and that would get us going. Just exactly the opposite happened-we only got two pts. out of the 10,000, then a false start put our 2nd man out of the decathlon for all practical purposes, then the harmer and shot didn't go as well as we had hoped (although we did score), then our key long jumper didn't show up, then no pts. in the steeple and a false start in the 400, only one qualifier in the 200, and a returning place-winner didn't make it in the int.hurdles. All of this happened Friday, but some good things too. We won the decathlon in a new record, qualified two men in the highs, three in the 100, three in the 1500, one in the 800, two in the 400, one in the 200, and two in the IH so we still hadiff hope for Sat. Nothing had happened, however, to make us catch fire.

Saturday, more went wrong in the field. Nothing in the PV (tired from the decathlon), nothing (but close) in the TJ and Disc, just a fraction of an inch or so between two high places and a 5th and tie for 6th in the HJ. The javelin went well with a clutch throw close to a PR (4th). The opening race was the 400 relay and I thought that might ignite us. A stirring win by four determined guys. Then the 1500 and two places on the final turn were gone in the stretch. The 100 and highs went well with 2-3 and 1-3, but after that things were downhill. Two finalists but no points in the 400, one finalist but no pts. in the 200 and 800, no points in the 5000.

Two places in the intermediates were a big help and then we got only 4th in the 1600 relay (2nd best time going into the meet). All of this added up to a 4th place in the meet, our lowest ever. We had never been worse than 2nd with three championships. Two of the teams wer had beaten badly in duals and one of these had beaten the winning team. Granted, big meets are different concerning points. It sort of looked like many people were waiting for someone else to do it for them. Everyone seemed cock-sure we were going to win during the early part of the season. Sort of a falsses optimism. Then heading toward the meet when some of the things that we had seen all year began to come through to team members, a real negative attitude set in. I think a lot of people (maybe me included) thought it would just happen, IT DIDM*E.

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I have never been more down in my life after a meet. I really didn't vant to go to the CCC meet, but 2 am not one to back down from things so we went. Several people didn't show up for the trip, but we went anyway and came through pretty well, getting a close 2nd place behind Michigan and beating MAU and GAU in the process. Central didn't bring a full team but Western did. We still didn't score any points in the distance races, but the field men came through real good and so did the sprinters, hurdlers, and rehky teams. Dave Gravender bounced back from his bad ordeal of the veek before with a solid 2nd place in the decathlon. Incidentally the javelin incident at the MAC probably hurt us more than we realized too. I was almost sick over the whole thing and Gary Bastaan said that if he hadn't already have virtually clinched the victory, the record, and the qualifying standard, it likely would have caused him to blow the whole thing.

Dils and Bastien did quite well at the NCAA meet. Jeff ran 50.08 to place 4th (3rd American) and set a new EMU and Mich.Collegiate record in the 400 meter hurdles. Bary scored 7317 to place ninkth overall (6th American). Both made All-American and we are proud of them. Gary's total was not as high as in the MAC, but he did a good job. The wind was bothersome in at least four or five of the events. Actually he did great except for the throws. Jeff went to the Natl.AAU in Calif. where he ran 51.1 twice, but did not reach the finals. He has been selected to run in the Natl.Sports Festival meet in Colo.Springs late in July. (all expenses paid).

We have a lot of people coming back and, hopefully, we can bounce back in 1979-80. Actually I think we did fairly well considering all the people we had missing this past year, but it did catch up with us at the conf. meet (even though we still could have won it, we had no margin for error). If you come right down to it the following were missing at the MAC meet for one reason or another: R.Bailey, E.Taylor, G.Ramsey, T.Korpal, J.Botan, T.Doyen, T.Korpal, G.Joseph, R.Jashington, B.Austin, R.Jurczyszyn, Ti.LaMay, T.Doherty, H.Helms, S.Ferguson, R.Fethke, T.Thames, K.Hiller, V.Pokryfki, A.Dgran, E.Henriksen, B.Harley, W.White, C.Reynolds. These all had at least an outside shot at placing and some were very sure points. Let's hope we don't have this problem next year. Everyone stay Whealthy, eligible, in school, on the team, etc. Several others were dffintthy sub-par most of the season and, at least one, was sick at the meet.

Everyone was blaming our loss in the MAC on everyone else, but it really was probably a combination of factors that did us in. Hopefully such an unlikely combination will not occur again in the mear future, but I think we can help insure that it won't by playing it smart in everything we do from training to conditioning to studies, to personal life, to attitude, to team spirit to competitive spirit and desire. It is a contagious thing and everyone can help everyone else by a good attitude. I don't want to dwell on last year, because it is over and I want to start off new ment fall. I want a new attitude, a new desire, and a new ambition to get going, forget the past and have a great year. It will happen if we get spone guys who are team-spirited, competitive, and hard-working. These are the kind I want and I don't want the other kind.

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I want people who will practice every day, working hard at the assigned workout at the assigned time and place. Those who are on their own wavelength end up hurting you in the long run. Some of them got hurt doing their own thing or didn't come, through or didn't show up when it counted. There is no substitute for hard work, regular practice and being coachable. The rebels always seen to let us down when it counts. Individuality is one thing, undependability and uncoachability is another. If we are going to take 4th place we can do it with 100 per centers who will never give us any problems at all. 95% or more of the points in the MAC meet were scored by people who I would classify as dependable. Some of those who didn't score may also be dependable, but some are not.

I also think there was too much bitching, complaining, often about nothing and this gets contagious too. We try to be fair to everyone, but it is hard to please everyone. I am sure you can't, at least all the time, but we try, and it is discouraging to us, to try to treat people right, even the lowest guy on the team and then be raked over the coals for being a bad guy. Some of you don't really know what a bad guy is like. I hope I never get pushed into being one. Someone accused up of being a tightwad. I don't know whether they think our money supply is endless. We went over our budget this year despite efforts on my part to the contrary. It is just impossible to keep supplying ondless pairs of shoos, often to people who are marginal performers at best. It is also impossible to take overyone to all the meets. We try to switch around, taking different people yet someone acquised us of always having the same lincup and never giving people a chance. Name one other school that has over 90 guys out for track. We have been given a 3% cut in our budget (including inflation) so things will be tight in 79-80 especially in the area of equipment (in the past we have been able to muithh funds from travel into equipment more). If someone isn't going to get equipment, be sure it will be the 4:30 milers, 6'4" high jumpers, 52-440 men etc rather than the top people. I'm not picking on anyone, that is the way things are.

We have always given everyone a chance and let everyone come out (MSU has about 20 guys on their entire team-they only want 20-less problems-hess bitching-less noney-less equipment), but evidentally it is not appreciated. If we have problems with lesser guys, we will simply operate with a smaller squad. We hope we do not have to go to this. We are determined to get a good attitude on our team. Sometimes we have one and sometimes we don[®]t. It is possible that several people will not be asked back out if they don[®]t agree to change their ways. Next year we are determined to have a good and pleasant year. Everyone can help in abhieving this goal by their attidudes.

We have a really good bunch of guys overall and I an generally proud of them. This spring, however, things started to slip and it hurt us and we want next year to be different. What you do as an indifidual and say as an individual can help or hurt the team. Sometimes the problems start with the lesser guys and spread. Think about what you are saying or doing and how it will affect the teaux or others. Little bitches magnify.

The housing office decided to split up the track floor. We still have suites and rooms reserved for our people, but they will be scattered (although mostly still in the same dorm, Phelps). I would advise everyone to get their housing, registration, financial aid, and other matters set at an early date so you will have no problems in the fall, will see you in Sept. if not before. Have a good summer, stay in shape, and be heady to go in September.


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Huron track team standouts Jeff Dils and Gary Bastien both placed in the top ten in their event at competition at the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) track

University of Illinois last week.

Dils, a senior, placed fourth in the nation in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles with a 50.08 clocking. In the 110-meter hurdles, Dils did not qualify when he placed fifth in the qualifying heat. In the intermediate hurdles event, Auburn University's James Walker ran 48.68 to win the title.

Bastien, two-time Mid-American Conference decathlon champion, accumulated 7.317 points to finish in total, Bastien tallied 3.670 points on ninth place overall. However, the the first day of competition by



best American finisher, giving Bastien "All-American" status. Brigham Young's Tito Steiner won the 10-event competition with a 7,918 point tally. Bastien placed 17th a year ago as a freshman in the NCAA championship meet.

IN ACCUMULATING HIS point sophomore decathlete was the sixth' running the 100-meter event in 11.3,

leaping 21' 7 3/4" in long jump competition, heaving the shot put 38'; 1/2", jumping 6' 6 3/4" in the high jump and clocking 50.56 in the 400-meter run. After the first day of action, Bastien was resting in the 11th spot. On day two, the sophomore picked up the pace by sprinting to a 14.8 finish in the 110-meter high hurdles, spiralled the discus 115'3", vaulted 15'5" in the pole vault event, threw the javelin 148'8", and ran a 4:22.5 in the 1500-meter run.

Although Dils and Bastien were the only Hurons who qualified for the championships, Eastern Michigan placed in a four-way tie for 36th place. Dils scored all four of EMU's points. The University of Texas-El Paso dominated the meet, as their foreign legion scored 64 points to win the meet. Villanova scored 48 points to take a distant second place in the team standings.



EMU TRACKSTERS COMBAT ADVERSITY TO COMPLETE UNBEATEN OUTDOOR DUAL MEET SEASON IN 1979

Eastern Michigan's track team had a fine season outdoors as they roared through their dual meet slate with a 7-0 record. The Eurons also placed high in most of the prestigious meets on the relay circuit and overall, had a good year.

The Green and White traveled south to open their season at Western Kentucky and the weather was warmer back home in Ypsilanti. They rose to the occasion, however, as they won the meet, beating Northern Illinois 110-50, Lincoln (MO) 131-17, and the host school 94-68. Jerry Wojtala was a double winner as he teamed with Roger Jones for a 1-2 finish in the 1500 and with Craig Gully and Maurice Weaver for a 1-2-3 finish in the 800 meters. Jones later came back to win the 5000. Keith Bailey won the 100, Jeff Dils and Kevin Jackson ran 1-2 in the high hurdles and Barry Summers and Ernie Demarse took the same places in the shot put (Ernie also won the discus). Other firsts went to Darwin Scott in the javelin, Ben Gibson in the 400 meters and the 400 meter relay team.

Cary Bastien and Jeff Dils went to the Florida Relays and did well. Gary was <u>3rd</u> in the decathlon at 7342, just missing the NCAA standard. His first day total of 3803 was particularly outstanding. His total set a new varsity and Michigan collegiate record. His performances were: 11.2; 22'10 3/4; 37'½"; 6'7½"; 50.0; 14.8; 118'7": 13'5½"; 152'6"; and 4:22.8. Jeff placed 4th in the 400 meters at 47.68.

The Hurons were the dominant team at the Ohio University Relays. Dave Gravender placed 3rd with an alf-time best of 6438. Barry Summers set a new varsity record in the shot put at $53^{\circ}3^{1}2^{\circ}$ (4th place) and also placed 3rd in the hammer. Jeff Dils and Kevin Jackson went 1-3 in the 110MHH. The Hurons also won the distance medley (Varick Tucker, John Putz, Maurice Weaver, Roger Jones), the shuttle hurdle relay (Art Doran, Gary Bastien, Jackson, Dils), the 800 meter relay (Billy Ray, Keith Griffith, Mark Gardner, Keith Bailey) and the 1600 meter relay (Ray, Ben Gibson, Griffith, Dils), the latter anchoring in 46.2. They were 2nd in the 6400 meter relay, 400 meter relay and 3200 meter relay and 3rd in the sprint medley relay against a good field of teams.

EMU traveled to Kalamazoo for a dual meet with arch-rival, Western Michigan and came home a 93-70 winner. For the first time ever against the Broncos, the Hurons came out of the field events ahead. Roger Jones started out the running events right with a win in the steeplechase as he clocked 9:03.2 in his first ever attempt at the event. The 440 yard relay team then upset WMU in a close race and the rout was on. Jeff Dils and Kevin Jackson went 1-2 in both hurdles and Dils was 2nd in the 100 and ran on both winning relays as well. Ray Washington was another double winner as he took the long and triple jumps. Other winners were: Steve Elliott-HJ; Ernie Demarse DISCUS; Roger Jones-5000 meters; Billy Ray 400 meters and Barry Summers-SP.

At the Dogwood Relays in Tennessee, Gary Bastien pulled a big upset as he won the decathlon in the pouring rain, beating a classy field of competitors. Jeff Dils and Kevin Jackson ran 13.7 and 13.9 in the 110 meter high hurdles as they placed 3rd and 5th. Roger Jones ran 14:06.8 for 5000 meters and just missed the NCAA standard. Ernie Demarse threw the discus 159'4¹/₂" and the distance medley team ran 9:42.2 (Craig Gully-1:51.5; Tony Cadogan-48.1; Jerry Wojtala-2:54.3; and Maurice Weaver-4:08.3). Dils had a 46.3 anchor on the 1600 meter relay.

The Hurons went to Mt. Pleasant and took care of Central Michigan by a score of $97\frac{1}{2}$ to $60\frac{1}{2}$. Jeff Dils won the HH, 100 and IH and led off the winning 400 meter relay team. Barry Summers set a new varsity record with 53'9" in the shot put as he finished 2nd. He also won the hammer. Darwin Scott (JAV), Pat Moore (LJ), Roger Jones and Maurice Weaver (1500M), Steve Elliott (HJ), Weaver (800M) and Norm Graham (200M) were other Green and White winners.

Barry Summers broke his own varsity records in both the hammer (178'5'') and shot put $(54'6'_2'')$ as he placed 3rd and 6th respectively. Dave Gravender bounced back from a disastrous day in the MAC (when he false-started in the 100 with zero points and speared a fellow competetor in the back with a javelin---Dave was in worse shape than his victim) by scoring a P.R. 6498 points to place 2nd. Jeff Dils had his usual good day as he took 2nd in the 110MHH (13.81) and won the intermediates (51.06) as well as leading off the 3rd place 400 meter relay team. Keith Bailey took 2nd in the 100 and anchored the 400 relay team. Graham was also 4th in the 100 and Kevin Jackson took the same place in the HH. Other places went to Pat Moore and Wendell Jackson-5th and 6th in LJ and the 1600 meter relay team of Keith Griffith, Mark Gardner, John Putz and Bailey which took 5th in 3:14.94.

Jeff Dils (HH & IH) and Gary Bastien (decathlon) met the very tough NCAA qualification standards and participated in the national championship meet at Champaign, Illinois. Both were named to the All-American team by placing in the top 6 Americans. Gary scored 6317 points to place 9th (5th American) and Jeff ran 50.08 in the 400 meter hurdles for 4th place (3rd American). His time set a new varsity and Michigan collegiate record.

All in all it was a good season. Coaches Bob Parks and Al Pingel are eagerly looking forward to next season already. Hurdles Jeff Dils and Kevin Jackson, miler Jerry Wojtala and discus thrower Don Strang are the only graduation losses. Everyone else is back plus the expected return to school of MAC sprint champion Russell Bailey and place-winners Tim Doyen, Jim Lotan and Gary Ramsey should help a great deal. Hopefully too, the unusual run of injuries suffered this season should end.

Finishing in second place was Western Michigan, while Bowling Green finished third. Ohio place fourth with 16 points, while Ball State finished fifth with 101/2 points.


The women netters suffered through a disappointing 4-7 season.

Gary Bastien won his event in fine style, scoring 7,440 points to set EMU varsity, Michigan collegiate and MAC records, in addition to qualifying for the NCAA finals. He earned "Outstanding Meet Performer" honors for his accomplishment. Jeff Dils, the stalwart senior co-captain, was named the meet's "top Point Scorer," as he rolled up 291/2 points in winning the high hurdles, intermediate hurdles and 400-meter relay, plus finishing third in the 100-meter dash and fourth in the 1600-meter relay, a truly outstanding individual effort.

Bouncing back a week later at the Central Collegiate Conference (CCC) championships at Notre Dame, the Hurons waged a fierce battle for the first, but were nipped by Michigan. Bastien injured himself polevaulting before the competiton and didn't participate. Dils duplicated his NCAA finish, placing fourth, but defeated '76 Olympic silver medalist Mike Shine.

The female thinclads placed fifth at the Midwest (AIAW) meet, despite leading the team totals after the first day of competition. The following weekend they tied with BOWLING Green for first in the MAC Invitational at Kent State. Grabbing six firsts, the highlight of the meet was frosh Ann Meachum's 19'-51/4'' effort in the long jump. Meachum, who attended Traverse City St. Francis High School, won the event, broke the varsity record, and gualified for the AIAW National championships the next weekend at Michigan State. Coach Dennis Faletti's runners won three of the relay events at the MAC meet, taking the 440, one- and two-mile relay competitions:

Dear Olympic Sopeful:

I'm sure President Carter's remarks on national television last Priday evening regarding this country's participation in the XXII Olympic Games to be held in Moscow this summer, have disturbed you greatly. We share your concern and want to reassure you that we are monitoring the situation closely.

Many have misinterpreted the President's remarks as a threat to boycott the Olympic Games. It was not. In our opinion, his cautious and carefully worded statement was but a warning to the Soviet Union that America's participation in the Games would be subject to further consideration if the Soviet Union's policy of unwarranted aggression continued and endangered the safety of our athletes and spectators. Let me emphasize that if further aggravation of the situation warranted a consideration to boycott the Games, you and your fellow athletes would most definitely take part in making that decision.

Barring traumatic world confrontation, the United States Olympic Committee stands firmly behind the ideals of world Olympiam, which rejects the infusion of world or national politics in the Olympic movement. Our statement to the press is attached.

Your welfare and eafety and that of your fellow athletes is of primary concern to the USOC in this matter. Our responsibility is to every amateur athlete in the nation, and we can assure you that the USOC would have no hesitation to act swiftly if your welfare, safety or rights as Olympic participants were subject to any caloulable risk. It is extremely important that you continue with your training with the same drive and determination that have marked your efforts to this point.

Again, let me stress that our primary interest is you. We unge you not to let the ourment situation alarm you, interfere with your training regimen, or impact negatively in any way on your personal drive and ambition in achieving your athletic goale. You...and the Olympic movement itself...represent what is good in the world, and the Olympic Games belong to the athletes of the world. You may rest assured that the United States Olympic Committee exists for you and that muintaining the integrity of the Olympic Games for you and your colleagues throughout the world guides our every move. We pledge to do everything in our power to protect your interest and to maintain your trust and confidence.

Should there be a change in the USOC's position, we will inform you as quickly as possible. In the meantime, should you wish to express your sentiments to us by telephone or is writing, we would be happy to learn of them.

PRESS STATEMENT - F. DON MILLER, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR UNITED STATES OLYMPIC COMMITTEE

I COMPLETELY REALIZE THE GRAVITY OF THE INTERNATIONAL SITUATION. I THOUGHT THAT THE PRESIDENT MADE A VERY CAUTIOUS STATEMENT RELATIVE TO THE OLIMPIC MOVEMENT. WE SINCERELY HOPE IT WILL NOT BE NECESSARY TO ACT UPON HIS CONSIDERATIONS. I BELIEVE THE PRESIDENT, IN MAKING HIS CAUTIOUS STATEMENT. DID NOT ADVOCATE THE BOTCOTTING OF THE OLYMPIC GAMES BUT WARNED THE SOVIET UNION THAT THE TRAVEL OF ATHLETES AND SPECTATORS TO THE GAMES WOULD BE SUBJECT. TO FURTHER CONSIDERATION IF THE SOVIET UNION CONTINUED WITH ITS UNWARRANTED AGGRESSION. PRESIDENT CARTER DID ' STRESS THAT THE UNITED STATES WOULD PREFER NOT TO SEE AMERICAN ATHLETES WITHDRAW FROM THE GAMES. WE VIEW HIS STATEMENT CONCERNING THE OLIMPIC MOVEMENT AS A RIGHLY SENSITIVE MATTER AND ONE THAT REQUIRES FURTHER STUDY BY THE UNITED STATES OLIMPIC COMMITTEE AND CONTINUED CLOSE MONITORING OF THE NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL SITUATION. IT WOULD AFPEAR, AND RIGHTFULLY SO, THAT OUR COVERNMENT IS KEEPING MANY OPTIONS OPEN: HOWEVER. I AM SADDENED AND DEEPLI REGRET THAT OUR GOVERNMENT DID FIND IT NECESSARY TO CONSIDER THE USE OF THE OLYMPIC MOVEMENT AS A VEHICLE IN INTERNATIONAL POLITICS. IT WOULD APPEAR TO ME THAT THIS POSSIBLE CONSIDERATION IS COUNTER-PRODUCTIVE AND WE WOULD BE PUNISHING OURSELVES IN USING OUR DEDICATED AMERICAN ATHLETES AS PANNS IN THIS INTERNATIONAL POLITICAL STRUGGLE. ALTHOUGH OUR CONCERN MAY BE PREMATURE, WE ARE CONVINCED THAT TO INVOLVE THE OLYMPIC GAMES IN THE INTERNATIONAL POLITICAL ARENA WOULD HAVE A SERIOUS AND DELETERIOUS IMPACT, NOT ONLY ON THE UPCOMING OLIMPIC GAMES IN LAKE PLACID AND THE 1984 OLIMPIC GAMES IN LOS ANGELES, BUT COULD SERVE AS THE CATALIST TO DESTROY THE MODERN OLIMPIC GAMES. IN OUR JUDGMENT, THE OLYMPIC MOVEMENT MUST REMAIN APOLITICAL AND CONTINUE TO FUNCTION IN THE PRIVATE SECTOR TO KEEP IT FROM BECOMING A VICTIM OF INTERNATIONAL POLITICS.

Dear Olympic Hopeful:

Much has happened since we last wrots. Since there appears to be great confusion as to the actions of the United States Olympic Committee in your behalf in recent weeks, we wanted to take this opportunity to bring you up-to-date on current developments. I'm sure all the discussion in the media relative to a "boycott" has been alarming to you, but we want to assure you that neither has the President of the United States asked the USOC to consider withdrawing from the Games, nor has the USOC agreed to such action at this point, contrary to what you've been reading and hearing. WE WILL SELECT AN OLYMPIC TEAM.

It's impossible, of course, to predict the outcome of the chain of events in this very fluid situation. We ask for your patience and trust in the USOC and your government during what we know is a very confusing time for you. We are doing our absolute best to got in your best interest.

To recap recent events, the USOC Executive Board, at its meeting on January 26, 1980, unanimously adopted a resolution to support President Carter's request that the USOC appeal to the International Olympic Committee to relocate or cancel the Games. A copy of the resolution is attached. The USOC will appear before the IOC at its meeting in Lake Placid, February 8. We will also request that the Soviet Union be censured for its actions and will recommend that the nationalistic implications in future Games be reduced to prevent further politicisation of the Games. Should the IOC not act upon our recommendations, it may be that President Carter will ask the USOC not to participate in the Games. Iou should know, however, that the USOC has until May 84, 1980, to enter our Olympic Team in the Games. It is unfortunate the word "boycott" is so widely used. It connotes reneging on a commitment, which is not the case. Were the President to <u>order</u> our athletes not to go, the word might be appropriate. Ecwever, there is no indication that such an order is forthooming.

Also enclosed is a copy of the testimony presented by USOC Executive Director, F. Don Miller, before the Senate Foreign Belations Committee on January 19. A similar version was presented to the House Subcommittee on Transportation and Commerce on January 31. Since it represents the USOC position, we thought it might be helpful to you in understanding the various implications surrounding these issues. You'll note that we stressed the point-of-view of our athletes that nonparticipation in the Games would not, by itself, bring about the withdrawal of Soviet troops from Afghanistan. The USOC has also asked our government that it consider stronger economic and foreign policy options to support our commitment to the President. Hopefully, the situation will become much clearer in the coming Page Ino

weeks. Again, let me emphasize that the President has not asked us to withdraw from the Games as yet. If and when that request is made, the USOC will meet to consider it. During this decision making process the attitudes of our Olympic hopefuls will be discerned.

While there are no statistics to back it up, we feel that the public is beginning to recognize the many facets of this complex issue and the serious implications involved. That is why time and our unity is so important. We encourage you and your fellow athletes to make sure that the media in your area are aware of all sides of the issue. We recommend you keep in touch with your representatives on the Athletes Advisory Council and with us at Olympic House if there are any issues that remain unclear. We thought you might find the enclosed press statement issued by more than 125 athletes at the Colorado Springs Training Center Last week helpful in understanding the prevailing point-of-view among our athletes. The January 28 edition of NEWSWEEK magazing also provides an excellent reference source in its unbiased, objective overview of the situation.

Our thoughts are with you and your fellow athletes. Keep your spirits high, do what you can to assist us in making the public awars of all sides of the issue and keep training. Please be assured that the United States will have an Olympic Team and that your efforts, hard work and dedication will not go unrecognized or unrewarded. A Joint Athletes Statement Concerning The Proposed Olympic Boycott January 25, 1980

We take this opportunity in exercising our right as Americans to express our opinions concerning the issue of Soviet intervention in Afghanistan. As athletes, we are also concerned with the use of an Olympic boycott as a political lever. We are all deeply distraught over the blatant attempts by the Soviet Union to militarily control its neighbors for political and economic interests. The question in our minds is what are the most effective sanctions the Western World can utilize in affecting Soviet policy?

The American Public is currently being bombarded by emotional statements from all sides. Their reactions indicate a real concern for world peace and our own national security. We athletes share this concern with all Americans. We would like the opportunity to present our own ideas and thoughts to the American People. We respect the right of all people to express their views.

There are many considerations made in the following statements. Foremost is the fact that Americanssend American athletes to theOlympics. We have all dedicated years of our lives and made countless personal sacrifices, without government support, in order that we may represent the U.S. at the Olympic Games. We feel that it is our strong expression of patriotism to the United States that we represent the American People at the Games. We therefore want to express our views to the American People.

The use of an Olympic boycott is not in the best interest of world peace. The very foundations of the Olympic Games began as an instrument of fostering peace. That fundamental ideal will be destroyed by the institution of an Olympic boycott. Furthermore, the purpose of such a boycott will not be fulfilled. The Soviet Union will not alter its foreign policy under the threat of a boycott. History shows that as in the case of Hungary and Czechoslovakia, the Soviets primary concern is military imperialism. We must have sanctions against such actions.

The most effective sanctions would be a total economic boycott of the Soviet Union. It seems ironic that we would continue to feed and aid our potential enemies, while boycotting the Olympics, and action which would hurt all of the free world. Should the Western World, following our lead, totally cut off the Soviet Union from all necessary imports, we could then hope for a change in the Soviet foreign policy.

Should this fail, or in order to further emphasize our concern we would then consider the boycott to be useful. This only if the proper sanctions fail to achieve our goal. We must use actions which achieve results, not symbolic gestures which only vent emotions. The Olympic Games should be used as a vehicle for peace, thus it is vitally important in these troubled times. We believe that boycotting and thus ultimately destroying the Olympic Games, would deepen world tensions and bring an end to an instrument of world peace and international brotherhood. RESOLUTION - UNITED STATES OLYMPIC COMMITTEE EXECUTIVE BOARD JANUARY 26, 1980 -

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has requested that the United States Dlympic Committee make certain proposals to the International Olympic Committee concerning the relocation or cancellation of the 1980 Summer Olympic Games; and

WHEREAS, the United States Olympic Committee has not entered a team in the 1980 Summer Olympic Games, and such an entry is not, under International Olympic Committee rules, required at this time:

RESOLVED that, pursuant to the request of the President of the United States, the United States Olympic Committee directs its officers and staff to propose to the International Olympic Committee that the 1980 Summer Olympic Games be transferred to another site or multiple sites, or be postponed or cancelled for this year; and

FURTHER RESOLVED, that subsequent to action by the International Olympic Committee on the United States proposal, the United States Olympic Committee shall meet to consider appropriate action to be taken by the United States Olympic Committee, under such circumstances as may exist at that time; and

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the United States Olympic Committee shall continue to select and prepare the United . States Olympic team, whether or not the United States competes in the Summer Olympic Games of 1980, in order to recognize the athletes who have been training as Olympians. STATEMENT - F. Don Miller, Executive Director, United States Olympic Committee To the Senate Foreign Relations Committee - January 28, 1980

Thank you. Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen. I am grateful for the opportunity to be with you this morning. Before embarking upon our discussion of this important and sensitive topic relative to the participation of American athletes in the 1980 Olympic Games, permit me, on behalf of the United States Olympic Committee, to offer sincere thanks for your decision not to act upon a resolution without our testimony.

Two recent meetings have helped the United States Olympic Committee greatly in understanding President Carter's position in this matter. The first was our meeting with Secretary Vance and Presidential Counsel Mr. Lloyd Cutler at the White House on January 18. The second occurred on Saturday, January 26, when Mr. Cutler met with and addressed the USOC Executive Board during its meeting in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

I am very pleased to report to you that our Executive Board, after day-long discussions, passed a resolution which supports President Carter's request that the United States Olympic Committee propose to the International Olympic Committee that the 1980 Olympic Games either be transferred to another or multiple sites or be cancelled if Soviet troops are not withdrawn from Afghanistan by February 20.

Before reading it. I would like to emphasize that the United States Olympic Committee and the nation's amateur athletes have not, for one moment, underestimated the gravity of the situation in Afghanistan. We have recognized from the beginning that our government must consider every possible option in formulating the proper policy to effect the withdrawal of Soviet troops from that country. I must advise, however, that there is skepticism within the amateur athletic community that refusing an invitation for American athletes to compete in the Games will seriously affect Soviet policy and lead to the withdrawal of troops from Afghanistan. We recognize that this point of view is not shared by others but feel this concern must be stated.

In taking this positive stance behind our nation's President, the United States Olympic Committee, speaking on behalf of the thousands of athletes it represents, sincerely hopes that our government will apply additional strong economic and foreign policy options in the coming weeks to reinforce the commitment made by the nation's athletes. One thing we find disconcerting is the finality of our action once it is taken in regard to Olympic participation, as opposed to the recovery opportunities which exist with most other options.

With your permission, I would like to read the text of the resolution passed unanimously by the USOC Executive Board which, incidentally, includes 17 athlete representatives and 20 former Olympians. (See Resolution - United States Olympic Committee Executive Board, January 26, 1980)

It should be noted also that at this time. President Carter has not requested that we boycott the 1980 Olympic Games in Moscow. The USOC has until May 24 to submit its entries. It can make a decision prior to that date not to send a U.S. Olympic Team to the Games without fear of sanction by the 10C.

Prior to the start of the Olympic Winter Games in Lake Placid, New York, on February 13, we will meet with the President of the International Olympic Committee, The lord Killanin, and the members of the LOC to propose (1) that the 1980 Summer Olympics be transferred to another site or multiple sites, or (2) that the Games be cancelled or (3) that they be postponed, and/or (4) that the Soviet Union be censured for its violation of international law, its disregard for human rights, and its blatant act of agression. Following the unanimous vote of our Executive Board we informed Lord Killanin of our formal resolution.

I might add that while we are aware that some governments have come out strongly in favor of not having their athletes participate in the Games, we know of no national Olympic Committee that has proposed boycotting the Games. In fact, according to a message received by the International Olympic Committee on January 25, 1980, the following National Olympic Committees and their governments have stated publicly that they are against a boycott: Argentina, Brazil. Chile, India, All African Countries, Ireland, France, Italy, Selgium, Spain, Portugal, Switzerland, Greece, Finland and Sweden. The National Olympic Committees of Germany, the Netherlands, Denmark and England have publicly stated opposition to a boycott.

Let me share with you an outside view as expressed in a telegram from the President of the Canadian Olympic Committee, to The lord Killanin on January 16: "If the momentum of a boycott builds -- the U.S. will end up in one or more of the following hopeless positions: (A) [t will have to try and persuade its friends and allies to do the same (Contrary to the Olympic Charter) and use all of its political "muscle" to do so. A boycott by the U.S. alone would be totally ineffective. (B) It will give the Soviet Union a chance for either (1) A major propaganda victory (directed against the west for failing to observe peaceful implications, etc., of the Olympic Games) or (2) A withdrawal, on the basis of a breach of unequivocal Olympic rules by enough of the western countries to cast the validity of any Games which might be held in doubt. In either case, it would be used by the Soviet Union to blame the U.S. and Western Countries for political interference. I think any propagandist worth his salt (no pun intended) could have affeld day with a scenario like that. (C) It would put the 1984 Olympic Games in serious jeopardy and possibly even those of Lake Placid, although this is more doubtful. (D) Despite its own protestations in the past regarding the mixing of politics and sport (e.g., Taiwan, Israel) the U.S. will be responsible for bringing about the final interlocking of politics and sport, from which the Olympic movement is unlikely ever to recover. (E) A whole 'generation' of athletes around the world will forever look to the U.S. as the reason why they lost their chance to complete in the Olympic Games."

The United States Olympic Committee...and the Olympic Committees of the other 137 nations and territories which are part of the worldwide movement that began with the modern Olympic Games in 1896, share a trust to preserve the integrity of the Games. That commitment and our responsibility to the IOC includes resisting, to the greatest extent possible political, religious and racial intrusions into the Games. We have other responsibilities as well: To our nation's amateur athletes, who have expended great effort, often at great personal sacrifice, in their preparation for the Games: To ourselves, recognizing that we are an agency in the private sector, and dependent upon the support of the American public: To our nation, recognizing that the Soviet strike into an area vital to the interests of the United States does represent a serious threat to world peace: and To our government, whose authority it is to decide what is and what is not in the best interest of this nation and its security. In meeting those important responsibilities we must make certain that our course of action in this matter is decided in the private sector, lest we be responsible ourselves for violating our commitment to world Olympism and subject ourselves to sanctions by the International Olympic Committee. Placing all these considerations in focus is not an easy task because frequently our responsibilities in one area come into direct conflict with our responsibilities in another of these areas. It is a sensitive and delicately balanced situation.

I cannot emphasize too strongly that it must be handled with utmost case and caution within the framework of the rules and regulations of the IOC. I don't think anyone in this nation would rest easily with the thought that the United States was responsible for the demise of the Olympic Games, or that it knowingly contributed to the end of a movement that has stood as an instrument of international brotherhood, amity and goodwill for more than 80 years.

While it is imperative that these deliberations remain within the private sector, that is not to say that the United States Olympic Committee and the nation's amateur athletes will not need all the support our government can provide in reinforcing our commitment to abide by the President's recommendations in these very difficult times.

The Olympic movement must survive. It represents what is good and wholesome in life. We

would be naive to presume that politics do not enter into the Games. However, it comes from outside sources and it does not lessen our responsibility in both national and international arenas to resist it from happening whenever and wherever possible. In this respect, the United States and the United States Olympic Committee have been the model for the world to emulate...and the world is watching us very closely now. The International Olympic movement belongs to the youth of the world, who are our future. They all need your support.

In closing, I would like to submit for the record, the following documents which, in our opinion, are pertinent to this discussion:

- (4) A telegram from The lord Killanin, President, International Olympic Committee, dated January 24, 1980.
- (5) A telegram from Madame Monique Berlioux, International Olympic Committee, to Don Miller, United States Olympic Committee, Dated January 25, 1980.

Dear Olympic Hopeful:

Now that the Olympic Winter Games are behind us, we want to bring you up-to-date on developments regarding our participation in the Summer Games in Moscow, and our feelings as to the effect the accomplishments of your fellow athletes in Lake Placidhad on the American people.

There is no doubt that Americans everywhere are reveling in the victories of our athletes and that there are strong feelings of national pride as a result of our involvement in the Winter Games. America is riding a wave of patriotism brought on by the Olympic Games. We suspect also that the tremendous exposure provided by the nationwide telecast of the Olympic Games has done much to increase understanding among the American people of the Olympic Games as an instrument of international friendship and world peace. Since we've returned to our headquarters in Colorado Springs...and even prior to leaving Lake Placid...we have noticed a trend toward shifting public opinion. The calls and letters we are receiving are much stronger in support of our sending a team to Moscow. We have also been noticing more favorable editorial comment in the nation's press. We have received feedback from representatives of several of our national governing bodies that they are also experiencing a shift in public opinion in their geographic areas. Time has helped, we feel, in easing the emotional impact of the issue that existed at the outset and in providing the vehicles and the opportunities to better inform the public. The assistance of so many athletes like yourself who have worked through their local media to tell the Olympic story has helped immeasurably.

You'll be pleased to know that your fellow athletes who participated in the Games at Lake Placid forwarded the attached letter to President Carter. There were 61 signators, which is impressive, since the draft of the letter was prepared just hours prior to their reception at the White House. Those who were not afforded the opportunity to sign the letter are being contacted by mail by your fellow athletes and are being asked to send their own letters to President Carter.

Regarding events that occurred in Lake Placid relative to the Summer Games, the USOC made two presentations to the International Olympic Committee requesting the Games be transferred to another or multiple locations, postponed or cancelled. The IOC voted unanimously to keep the Games in Moscow, but did leave some options open in the event the world situation further deteriorates. As far as IOC rules are concerned, the USOC has until May 24th to indicate whether or not a team from the United States will participate and what the makeup of the team will be. Legally, any decision relative to our participation in the Games rests with the USOC's House of Delegates, the final decision-making authority for all USOC policy matters. The House of Delegates will address the issue at its April 11-13 meeting here in Colorado Springs. While it is impossible to predict the outcome of the meeting, the House of Delegates will either make a decision to go or not to go to the Games at that time or will defer

making the decision to another date prior to the May 24 deadline. There is wide misconception that the USOC has already boycotted the Games as a result of statements made by a State Department spokesman.

The USOC will continue to act in your best interest and that of your fellow athletes and intends to keep all its options open with hope and prayers that an easing of world tension and the situation in Afghanistan will permit us to accept the invitation of the Moscow Olympic Organizing Committee. You should know, however, that we have informed President Carter that when the time comes for our decision, we will abide by his wishes if he indicates at that time our attendance at the Games represents a threat to national security. Events of recent days relative to proposals for the withdrawal of Soviet troops from Afghanistan and the establishment of a neutral state are most encouraging. Regardless of what happens, we will select a United States Olympic Team, and will provide its members with the due honor and recognition they deserve.

The attachments will clarify further the USOC position. We encourage you to maintain your enthusiasm and keep training as hard as you can. We all must hang on to the hope that it will be possible for our athletes to compete in Moscow. To do otherwise would be a disservice to you and your fellow athletes who have trained so long and hard for the opportunity to represent this great nation at the Olympic Games. We will continue to keep in touch to apprise you of any new developments.

In view of statements made today by representatives of President Carter's administration, the United States Olympic Committee feels it important to restate its position relative to the acceptance or rejection of the Moscow Organizing Committee's invitation to send a delegation to the Olympic Games this summer.

As was stated on February 14, 1980, at a press conference in Lake Placid, New York, any decision regarding our non-participation in the Games rests with the USOC's House of Delegates, which has final decision making authority in all USOC policy matters. The House of Delegates meets in Colorado Springs, Colorado, April 11-13, at which time the question of accepting or rejecting the invitation will be addressed. According to the rules of the International Olympic Committee, the USOC has until May 24, 1980, to indicate whether or not a team from the United States will participate and what the makeup of the team will be. Regardless of the outcome of these deliberations, a United States Olympic team will be selected to recognize the athletes who have been training as Olympians. In the meantime, we are urging our athletes to continue with their training with the same spirit and drive that have marked their earlier efforts. We are also asking the American people to continue with their generous financial support to keep the many programs designed to provide increased training and development opportunities for the nation's amateur athletes in effect.

STATEMENT BY THE UNITED STATES OLYMPIC COMMITTEE LAKE PLACID, NEW YORK February 14, 1980

The United States Olympic Committee is disappointed, but not surprised, that the International Olympic Committee has chosen not to act favorably upon the recommendations that the Olympic Games scheduled to be held in Moscow this summer be relocated to another or multiple sites, postponed or cancelled. The USOC acted in good faith and supported the request of the President of the United States in presenting its case to the International Olympic Committee. USOC President, Robert J. Kane, and the USOC Executive Director, F. Don Miller, presented the USOC's position on two separate occasions...first to the IOC Executive Board on February 8, and then to the General Assembly on February 11. We believe we have done our best to support President Carter's request and the wishes of our own constituency. Although we are still of the persuasion that it is inappropriate for the Games, a symbol of peace, harmony and unity among the youth of the world, to be held in a capital of a nation which is engaged in aggression against a neighboring country, it is apparent that nothing further can be done at this time to alter the current attitudes of the IOC.

As was stated in The lord Killanin's remarks to the press on February 12, 1980, the IOC was in agreement, without dissent, that the Games should be held in Moscow this summer in accordance with the agreement signed between the parties on October 23, 1974. There is no doubt, however, that after its long and detailed discussion of the matter, the IOC is not insensitive to the conditions that have posed this most serious threat to the Olympic movement. The USOC is very hopeful that the recommendations put forward by the IOC to the National Olympic Committee of the Soviet Union and the Moscow Organizing Committee and to the governments of the involved countries will be heeded so that the "proper atmosphere" for the conduct of the Games can be restored. As The lord Killanin said, the IOC is leaving all options open should a change in the world situation warrant another look at the basic condition of holding the Games in Moscow next summer. In the interim, the United States Olympic Committee must continue with the formidable task of closely monitoring the situation in order to make the propen, decision relative to the participation of American athletes at the Games. As an independent, apolitical organization, we have a great responsibility to the nation's athletes whom we represent, and to the International Olympic Committee, whose rules and regulations we have pledged to uphold along with the National Olympic Committee of the other 141 nations and territories. On the otherhand, we recognize the desires and interests of our government and the emotional impact that this issue has had on the American people. We must remain open to the President's views of what is best in the national interest and to the will of the American people. Of course, the USOC will accept any decision concerning our participation in the Games the President makes in view of his analysis of what is best for the country.

We are acutely aware of the many factors and responsibilities to be considered and intend to weigh the effects of all the alternatives during our deliberations and in reaching any decisions that may come from them. The United States Olympic Committee has until May 24, 1980, to indicate to the Moscow Organizing Committee whether or not a team from the United States will participate in the Olympic Games and what the makeup of the team will be. Were we to accept the invitation and withdraw after that date we would be subject to sanctions by the IOC. We have been advised by our USOC Counsel that any decision relative to non-participation in the Games rests with the USOC's House of Delegates, which has final decision-making authority in all USOC policy matters. The next meeting of the House of Delegates is scheduled to be held in Colorado Springs, Colorado, during the weekend of April 11-13, where the question of accepting or rejecting the Moscow Organizing Committee's invitation will be carefully examined and discussed in full. The issues are complex and the decisions will not come easily.

The United States Olympic Committee continues to urge Olympic honefuls to go on with their dedicated training. The USOC will select and prepare the United States Olympic Team, whether or not the United States competes in the Summer Olympic Games in 1980, in order to recognize the athletes who have been training as Olympians. In this connection, many alternatives are under study and it is our full intention to provide them with the due honor and recognition they so justly deserve.

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STATEMENT

ATHLETES' ADVISORY COUNCIL OF THE UNITED STATES OLYMPIC COMMITTEE TO PRESIDENT JIMMY CARTER

MARCH 22, 1980 8:00PM, EST, WASHINGTON, DC

On March 21, 1980, at the White House, President Carter affirmed his position that, in response to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, the United States will not send a team to the 1980 Olympic Games.

The Athletes' Advisory Council deplores the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. We feel, consistent with President Carter's position, that a visible, peaceful demonstration is the most effective means by which the world and the world's athletes can present this message to the people of the Soviet Union.

We also agree with the President that the United States must assume leadership in convincing the rest of the world to make the 1980 Olympic Games an instrument of protest.

The Athletes' Advisory Council now presents a plan to enhance the effectiveness of such protest. This plan calls for participation by the athletes in the 1980 Olympic Games. subject to the following limitations:

(1) Each team will arrive in the Soviet Union immediately prior to its competition.

(2) Only the flag bearer will take part in the opening ceremony.

(3) Athletes will remain within the training facilities or Olympic village during the period of the Games.

- (4) Athletes will not participate in any victory ceremony.
- (5) Athletes will not engage in tourist activity.
- (5) Athletes will leave the Soviet Union immediately
- following their competition.

(7) Athletes will not participate in the closing ceremony.

We believe this plan will increase the effectiveness of our protest for the following reasons:

 It provides an extraordinary opportunity to stage a peaceful demonstration on Soviet soil visible to the entire world

(2) Such symbolic means of protest will be controlled by the athletes themselves, thus preventing Soviet media from equating our presence with approval of the Soviet Union's foreign policy.

(3) Such a form of protest, attractive to other National Olympic Committees and athletes, will provide a broader expression of the world's opprobrium.
(4) The plan meets the hopes of the American people who have so strongly supported our preparations with money and heartfelt good wishes. They will be proud of the American athletes who undertake this dual mission of sport and diplomacy.

If you like the proposal and feel it has merit there are many things you can do to help assure its success.

- Contact the newspapers, television, and radio in your area. Give them a copy of the proposal and your opinion.
- Contact other athletes in your area and solicit their support in the same manner.

Your support and immediate attention to this matter are extremely important.

SPECIAL INFORMATION

Competitors in events necessitating trials must report to the CLERK OF COURSE at the STADIUM one hour prior to the time of the event being contested. The Referee of the meet may invoke a "Time Rule" in those field events in which competitors may delay the orderly running of the event in which they are competing. Long Jump, Triple Jump, Pole Vault and High Jump surfaces are Pro Turf. Competitors will not be allowed to use spikes longer than ³⁶ inch. ¹/₄ to ³/₈ are recommended, although flats have been used successfully. The Javelin will be thrown from a Pro Turf runway. Shot, Discus and Hammer slabs are brushed cement. All Field Event equipment and areas comply with IAAF specifications, Athletic trainers and physician will be available. Track is of Pro Turf (Urethane). Spike length must be as indicated for jumping surfaces. Only those implements and starting blocks furnished by the Games Committee may be used.

NOTE: The additional U. S. Olympic Trials Standard is provided for those events in which additional competitors are needed to simulate Olympic competition in the Trials; i.e., events where the United States is weaker in depth. Additional conditions are listed under Criteria, #9, below:

1980 U. S. OLYMPIC TRIALS - CRITERIA FOR QUALIFYING FOR ENTRY

- All standards must have been achieved between May 31, 1979 and June 7, 1980, except for those competitors who meet the standard in the 1980 National AAU Outdoor Championships. All standards must be met in outdoor competition — no indoor marks will be accepted.
- The standard must be made in a regularly scheduled Track & Field meet between two or more recognized teams.
- The meet must be an event in which no less than ten (10) individual Track & Field events are contested, and officiated by certified officials.
- 4. Wind readings must be reported from officially accepted gauges for qualifying marks in the 100m, 200m, 110m hurdles, long jump and triple jump. No wind-aided marks will be accepted, and no marks will be accepted without wind information.
- Walking marks must be submitted from competition held on recognized, certified courses.
- 6. When fully automatic (electronic) times are submitted for qualifying standards, the system must meet I.A.A.F. standards for a fully automatic system (i.e., started with the gun and electronically photographed at the finish).
- All running event marks must be made at metric distances. No conversions from imperial distances will be accepted.
- All field event performances should be measured in feet and meters. Both measurements must be submitted on the entry blank.
- If additional athltes are needed in any event to conduct necessary rounds, the following criteria will be used:
 - 9.1 Athletes who do not meet the Olympic Standard for entry in those events with an additional U. S. Olympic Trials Standard, but meet the U. S. Standard (in order to complete the necessary rounds)

AMATEUR REGISTRATION AND OTHER INFORMATION

Only certified amateur athletes (U. S. citizens) eligible for international and Olympic competition will be permitted to compete. Any amateur athlete residing in the United States may be certified as an amateur by registration with the Board of Athletics Congress, Inc., in the state in which he resides.

All intending competitors not already registered with the AC should do so at once. Application forms for applying for registration will be mailed to any address by the Chairman of your district association Registration Committee (see page 4) upon receipt of a request accompanied by a self-addressed stamped envelope. When this form is filled out properly and either presented personally or mailed with the prevailing registration fee, of the Board of Athletics Congress, Inc., a registration card will be issued. This card certifies the bearer to be an amateur and entitles him to compete in all sanctioned games until the expiration of same, one year from date of issue. Blanks with "applied for" in place of registration number will not be accepted.

REGISTRATION

Registration annually will cover the period January 1 through December 31.

Application forms for registration, obtained from the AAU Association Registration Committee (see page 4), must be fully completed and signed by each applicant for membership, and must be endorsed by an official of the club the athlete wishes to represent. will be given preference on the following basis for entry into the Trials:

- Relative position of finish in head-on competition in National Championship meets.
- 9.3 Relative position of finish in head-on competition during the year.
- 9.4 Consistency of performance in quality competition.
- 9.5 Best marks posted.
- 9.6 Relative current status of best marks posted.
- Any athlete meeting the U. S. Standard, but not achieving the Olympic Standard MUST MEET the Olympic Standard if he finishes in the top three in the Trials and wishes to represent the United States in the Olympic Games. Clarification of this point will be made upon request of the Meet Director.
- 11. All athletes who are American citizens who are eligible for International and Olympic competition, who have met the Olympic Games or U. S. Olympic Trials Standards and who complete and submit entry information are eligible for entry into the U. S. Olympic Trials, provided those meeting only the U. S. Olympic Trials Standards are accepted into the competition under provisions of Criteria #9 above. Each athlete accepted into the competition will be provided travel, room and board one day prior to his contested event and one day after completion of his event, inclusive.
- Anti-doping tests will be administered at the Trials. Use of forbidden substances will result in not being selected to the U.S. Olympic Track & Field Team. A list of illegal substances is available from the U.S. Olympic Committee.
- All marks submitted must be achieved on Track & Field facilities that meet I.A.A.F. standards.
- 14. All competitors must be members of Athletics Congress, Inc.

The application is submitted to the Registration Committee (see page 4) for approval, and must be accompanied by the yearly membership fee.

If the application is approved, a membership card will be issued showing applicant's name, AC number, affiliation or unattached, date of expiration of the registration, and date of birth.

Upon making registration application, every fee-paying registered athlete will automatically be enrolled in the AAU medical and accident insurance plan with the established insurance fee being collected unless the athlete chooses not to be insured.

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
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Michigan hurdler Shelby Johnson, right, won't catch former EMU ace Jeff Dils at left

M's Lattany jumps 7-3 at M Relays

Michigan posted NCAA qualifying standards in the distance medley and high jump and set two field house and varsity records before a full house at the Michigan Relays in its first home appearance of the indoor track season.

Mike Lattany jumped 7-3 to break his own record of 7-2½ that set varsity and field house records last year. In a three-way battle, Lattany topped Mike Windsor of Central Michigan and Dennis Lewis (unattached) who both jumped

7-3 but in more misses than Lattany.

Lattany's jump also was good enough to top the NCAA qualifying standard of 7-1.

Michigan's distance medley team of Tim Thomas, Ted Dobson, Dan Beck, and Dan Heikkinen placed second behind Michigan State at 9:45.18 to make the NCAA qualifying standard of 9:50.0. Western Michigan also qualified with a third place time of 9:48.03.

The Spartan squad pulled into the lead with 110 yards to go, but in the final⁽²⁰⁾ yards Heikkinen closed

in on the four-yard lead to finish four hundredths of a second behind Michigan State's Keith Moore.

Heikkinen followed up his 4:03.6 performance in the mile portion of the distance medley with a second-place showing the twomile. The Michigan senior tricaptain clocked in at 8:52.25 behind Ted Rupe (unattached) in 8:49.12.


During the 1969-70 and 1970-71 school years, Eastern could truly be called the home of national champions. In 69-70, they won 4 NAIA National Championship (Men's Basketball, Men's Swimming and Men's Indoor and Outdoor Track) and were NAIA Men's Gymnastics and XC and NCAA Division II XC Runner-ups, giving them 7 1st or 2nd place finishes. In 70-71 they were even better winning a record 5 NAIA and NCAA Division II titles. They won the Men's NAIA Swimming, NAIA Indoor and Outdoor Track (2nd Straight Year) and became the first and only school to win two different XC titles in the same year. They the NAIA and NCAA Division II titles. They were also the NCAA Division II runner-ups in Men's Basketball. This gave Eastern 9 national titles and 4 runner-up spots in just two years.

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
EASTERN'S OLYMPIANS



Hayes Jones was the best all-around track athlete in school history. He held the Indoor 55M HH (7.24) and Outdoor 110M HH (13.74) records for 34 years. He remains among the top ten in the I-55M (6.34), O-100 (10.54) and I & O- Long Jump (23'11 1/2" & 24' 0 1/ 2"). He was the first man to win the 110M HH and 400M IH at the NCAA Championship Meet in the same year (1959). Won a Bronze in the 1960 110M HH and Gold in the 1964 110M HH.



Dave Ellis was an outstanding distance runner for the then Hurons. One of two EMU runners to be a 4 time XC All-American (NAIA). Broke all of the school records at 3000M and higher. Still remains among the top five in all but one catergory. Won 5 NAIA Individual National Championships. Won a Silver in the 10,000 at the 1967 PAN-AM Games. Competed in the 5000 and 10,000 for Canada in 1968.




Tony Nelson made the most out of his two years at Eastern. All-American in the 120yd HH (4th-1972) and Mid-American Conference Outdoor champ in the 120yd HH (1973- Conference record 13.9). Among the top ten in the Indoor and Outdoor HH. Competed in the 110M HH for Canada in 1972. Business manager for the 1976 Olympics.



Hasely Crawford was injured a lot but had an outstanding year in 1975. He won 5 MAC/ CCC indoor and outdoor sprint titles and two National titles: Indoor 60yd Dash and Outdoor 100yd Dash. Holds school records in the I-55 (6.14-75), I-300 (30.24-75) and O-100 (10.18-75). Competed in the 100 and 200 for Trinidad in 1972, 1976, 1980 and 1984. Gold medalist in the 100M Dash in 1976. 100M Finalist in 72 and 80 and 200 finalist in 76.



Earl Jones had an outstanding career cut short by a car accident. 7 time All-American who won the 1985 NCAA Outdoor 800 and ran on the 1984 1st place NCAA Indoor Distance Medley Relay. Held the school record in the outdoor 1500 for 12 years. Still holds the outdoor 800 mark at 1:43.74 in 1984, which at the time was a U.S. Record. Bronze Medalist in the 800 for the USA in 1984.



Tommy Asinga followed Earl Jones and Mark Dailey in the long line of outstanding EMU 800 runners. He won 13 MAC/CCC titles out of a possible 16, was a 7 time All-American and ran on the 1994 1st place NCAA Championship Distance Medley Relay. Ran 1:47.64 (I) and 1:46.74 (O), both of which are 3rd fastest in school history. Ran for Suriname in 1988 and 1992 and is training for 1996.

More than 140 years after it's beginnings as a teacher training institution, Eastern Michigan has seen four name changes. In 1849, EMU was founded by the state of Michigan as Michigan State Normal School, which became the first school west of Albany, New York to be dedicated to the sole task of training young men and women to be teachers. In 1899 it's name was changed to Eastern Michigan Normal College and then to Eastern Michigan College in 1956. With the establishment of several colleges and a graduate school, EMU attained university status in 1959. But no matter what the name, EMU means only one thing to it's students, faculty, and staff: Excellence.

Today, EMU has grown to five colleges: a nationally acclaimed College of Education, a diversified College of Arts and Sciences, a professionally oriented College of Health and Human Services, an innovative College of Technology, and an expanding College of Business. In addition the Graduate School continues to grow and serve the community. Combine all of these colleges and you have a wide range of academically challenging courses, programs, and degrees from which EMU's 25,000 students can choose from. Eastern has ten undergraduate degrees available in such fields as art, chemistry, computer science, economics, foreign languages, humanities, communication and theatre arts, psychology, finance, education, special education, nursing education, music education, African American studies, political science, public administration, English language and literature, history, and written communications among others. Eastern has a nationally reputation in more than just elementary and secondary education. They have the best Special and Early Education program in the U.S., A Nursing program which has been one of the top five in the country since the 1940's, a College of Business among the top 15%, an improving Sports Medicine Program, and a Forensics (debate) team, which hasn't finished lower than 3rd nationally since 1965. Not only are Masters available in several fields, Eastern also has a doctoral program in educational leadership. Eastern is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, and the National Association of Schools of Music.

The Eastern Michigan campus is located in Ypsilanti, Michigan, which is about 40 miles from downtown Detroit and 20 minutes from Detroit Metropolitan Airport. EMU students, faculty, and staff can enjoy the rich cultural resources and recreational facilities of Detroit, Ypsilanti, and Ann Arbor. Among Eastern's 420 acres is a state of the art music facility, an \$18.2 million recreational-intramural building, a science complex with the latest technology, an educational resource center, an instructional theatre, a student union which features a bowling alley, bookstore, and several fast food restaurants, a seven story classroom building, two radio stations, and a newly finished outdoor recreation facility which includes a lake, restaurant, basketball courts, and three sand volleyball courts. Enhancing the college experience is the Gary M. Owen College of Business in downtown Ypsilanti, and the Corporate Education center, which includes a 18-hole golf course and a Radison hotel alongside Ford Lake.

Besides being strong in education, Eastern has also maintained a strong reputation in athletics. Bob Welch, Terry Collins, Chris Hoiles (Baseball), Dave Pureifoy, Ron Johnson, John Banaszak (Football), Hayes Jones, Hasely Crawford, Earl Jones, Gordon Minty, Dave Ellis, Abe Rosenkrantz, Red Simmons, Dean Rockwell (Men's XC/Track), George Gervin, Kennedy McIntosh, Earle Higgins, Grant Long, Laurie Byrd (Basketball), Kevin Miller (Swimming), Sue Parks, Donna Donakowski, Mirielle Sankatsing (Women's XC/Track) have distinguished themselves during and after their days of wearing the Green and White. The Eagles have won 51 Mid-American Conference championships and 16 NAIA and NCAA National Titles. Among the memorable moments was winning 4 NAIA and NCAA-CD National titles in XC and Track in 1970-1971 (A feat which has never been matched), winning five consecutive NAIA and NCAA National Swimming crowns (1967-1971), 15 straight MAC swimming titles (still going strong), five straight Men's XC championships (1990-1994), Runner-up in the 1976 NCAA Division I College Baseball World Series, pulling off one of the biggest upsets in college football bowl history beating 18 point favorite San Jose State in the California Bowl in 1987, and playing North Carolina tough for 30 minutes in the Sweet 16 of the Men's NCAA Division I Basketball tournament in 1991. Eastern offers 11 varsity sports for men and 9 for women. They also have club teams in Women's soccer, water polo, and Ice Hockey. The hockey team, which plays in nearby Plymouth (a 20 minute drive), has reach the championship game of the National College Club Ice Hockey tournament the last two years. In the 1995-1996 school year, Eastern will make Women's Soccer and Women's golf varsity sports. The west end of campus holds Rynearson Stadium, a 30,000 seat football field, the Olds/ Marshall outdoor track, Oestrike Stadium (Baseball), a soccer field, and two practice football fields. The central campus area contains the varsity softball fields, four softball fields used for intramural, Bowen Field House which is used for basketball, volleyball, track, and wrestling, Warner Gym which is the site of gymnastic meets, and a well equipped Recreational-Intramural Building which includes racquetball, volleyball, wallyball, badminton, and basketball courts, an indoor batting cage, a running track, weight and exercise rooms, pool tables, a club pool, and Jones Natatorium, the largest pool in the state and third nationally. For students choosing to live on campus, housing is available in 13 residence. Among the halls are two all female dorms and 11 coed dorms. Eastern also has two academic dorms, Jones and Goddard. In order to live there, students must have and maintain a certain G.P.A. Eastern also has five apartment complexes located on

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
